In response to your letter of March 7, following is a paragraph by paragraph reply to "Plaintiff's Objections to Defendant's Desegregation Plan."

- 1. Equal Opportunity Employment is the present policy of the Division of Youth Services. We recruit, hire, and promote the best-qualified individual, regardless of color. Our advertising, which is handled through the Division of Personnel and Retirement and through the Florida State Employment Service, states that we are an Equal Opportunity Employer. We recruit from all students in the appropriate subject matter areas in the major educational institutions in Florida. We follow a policy of promoting from within. When a promotion is available, it is advertised to all employees. All persons qualified under the Division of Personnel and Retirement standards are encouraged to apply. The best applicant will be promoted, regardless of race. We do not follow a quota system in employment or promotion policy. The attached personnel turnover figures indicate that it is difficult to hire and retain personnel of any description.
- 2. The allegation that white and black students are treated differently is without foundation. Treatment is based on behavior.

During the past several months, the Okeechobee School has implemented reality group therapy in its cottages. This new group therapy process causes behavior change through peer pressure, rather than staff counseling and supervision. It provides a means of controlling aggressive behavior other than by isolation with other

aggressive individuals. By means of this approach, Bunche Cottage has been integrated already. The remaining four cottages with all black populations will be integrated as the group therapy process proceeds.

- 3. Same response as #1. Note the personnel turnover figures. With regard to the principals, it is true that for a time there was only one representative of the academic program at staff meetings. That representative was the white principal, who was the senior of the two principals. Experience showed, however, that the single representative provided insufficient communication with the academic program, so the representation was broadened to include both principals.
- 4. Staff housing at Okeechobee is not reserved for white staff. Staff housing is allocated to those staff members whose jobs make it essential or highly desirable that they live on campus so as to be on call for emergency duty. The allocation is based on the position, not the race of the individual holding the position. Plaintiff fails to mention that there are also staff apartments available at the Okeechobee School, and that these have been allocated to black and white staff members.

There is insufficient staff housing at Okeechobee to make it generally available to all employees. The Division of Youth Services has repeatedly requested, and is again requesting in the 1970-71 legislative budget, additional staff housing. A request is also pending to establish a trailer park on the school grounds. If and when these requests materialize, housing will be made available to eligible employees without regard to race.

- 5. Black studies are presently part of the social studies curriculum for all students at the Okeechobee School. Haircuts in whatever style the student prefers are allowed for all students, provided the haircuts are of reasonable length.
- 6. Every effort is being made at the Florida School for Girls, both campuses, to balance the make-up of the staff. The situation differs from that of the other schools, in that the campuses are twelve miles apart. Most of the employees have been in their present posts for a number of years, and live in housing close to the campus where they work. Forced transfers of staff would result in resignations of

staff members, black and white. We are proceeding with staff balancing at a rate consistent with institutional procedures, and at a rate that is not disruptive.

- 7. We are moving toward a more balanced ratio.
- 8. The Gilchrist School will operate under the same Equal Opportunity Employment policies outlined in #1. The Gilchrist School is designed for the most disturbed children in the Division of Youth Services, and will provide intensive treatment. Assignment will be very limited ten to fifteen units, depending on legislative authorization. Eligibility for staff housing will be allotted based on staff position.
