Re: Semi-Annual Report to CAB

Dear Compliance Advisory Board Members:

Section 8.03(e) of the Stipulated Agreement provides that "the parties shall jointly compile semi-annual reports outlining the degree of progress...", including "recommendations". It is our belief and expectation that "jointly" does not mean an endeavor which is mutually written but that our report is contemporaneous with the report of the State. It would seem to be more reasonable that CAB receive simultaneous reports from each party reflecting the different perspectives and experiences.

Attached to this letter is a summary of the status of items required by the Consent Decree to have been undertaken prior to the date of this report. However, consistent with the language of the Consent Decree, we respectfully make the following observations, reflections and recommendations:

1. As a general proposition, our working relationship with the State of Wyoming has improved, even though we remain vigilant and committed to strong monitoring and compliance checking. The parade of events over the last six months has been a learning encounter.

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- 2. During the course of implementing the Consent Decree, we naturally become aware of situations and events that have occurred or are occurring that may impede the successful implementation of the Decree within the time frame contemplated and set forth in the Decree. Since the parties have embarked into unchartered waters, sometimes the going is smooth, sometimes rough, and as we break through one wave, another hits. Implementation is a more difficult battle than arriving at the Consent Decree, but we in the State of Wyoming have a golden opportunity to fulfill a vision.
- Of the situations of which we have become cognizant, they include, among others, concern by staff at WSTS about the capacity of the Superintendent to provide full-time stewardship to WSTS due to a splitting of labor between one task as Superintendent and the other task as Director of Developmental Disabilities. It appears to us that there is a lack of concentrated direction beginning at the top of the organization chart which contributes to low-staff It may well be that this problem is more a matter of embryonic jitters that will improve with the passage of time and getting some innings under the belt. However, it is a concern to us which will be carefully monitored. Our concern is no reflection on the Superintendent's abilities, but on the inherent risks in two related but difficult and time consuming performing assignments.
- 4. The difficult portions of the implementation of the Decree are forthcoming, for example, incorporating the recommendations of ENAT as discerned in the reports (which we have not received as of this report), but which we understand the reports to include systemic changes.
- 5. Some of our more specific recommendations would be that WSTS automatically inform us of placements with the necessary information, for example, a copy of the transition plan. Other recommendations would be that WSTS improve its training to staff in several areas. We have gleaned as a result of monitoring that WSTS is experiencing high worker's compensation claims in such matters as lifting residents, which obviously has a direct correlation to the adequacy of training. What looks good on paper, when carried out, may require change. We will follow up on a more extensive report.
- 6. The past six months highlighted concerns about: access to information and staff which has been resolved; and, the need for an independent death review committee (which discussion is nearing conclusion). P&A has and is attempting to review the events and circumstances surrounding resident deaths. We will submit our findings to the State and CAB. We did reach conclusion on class

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member eligibility procedures after several months of negotiations, but, as with other elements of the Decree, the struggle may well be in execution.

7. Our experience with CAB in the discussions on the independent death review committee has been positive. CAB can be a facilitating force that decreases the time that otherwise might be spent between the parties in reaching a consensus.

In conclusion, the first six months have been a growth experience for all and the next six months should reflect our mutual learning about each other and the difficult road ahead. Should you have any questions or need for expansion on any issue, please feel free to contact us.
