# Middle School Reconfiguration 

Controlled Choice Middle School Assignments Results for the 1999-2000 School Year

The Comprehensive Remedial Order (CRO) requires that the District 205 middle school grade structure be reconfigured from a $7-8$ grade structure to a grade 6-7-8 configuration. The middle school reconfiguration which will satisfy a part of the mandate of the CRO by allowing for the assignment of a larger number of elementary students to West Zone elementary seats, also will provide numerous educational advantages for middle school students. One of the most significant advantages for these students is the opportunity for a three-year experience at the middle school level, which allows staff to become more familiar with the individualized learning needs of students and provides a longer transition period for high school. Also, the 6 through $8^{\text {th }}$ grade structure is the middle school structure that is most often used nationwide.

Due to facilities limitations, the District was unable to make this structural change until (a) the Ellis Arts Academy children vacated the Kennedy Middle School, which is needed for use as a middle school, and (b) the new Rockford Environmental Science Academy (RESA) is completed. The construction of RESA is expected to be completed in July of 1999 and will be occupied for the 1999-2000 school year. Construction is underway at the Kennedy Middle School facility, which will be ready for occupancy in August of 1999.

The Department of Desegregation has completed the 1999-2000 Early Assignment batch of students entering middle school in grades six and seven. Following are significant factors that impacted the results of this process.

1. It was necessary to reduce the assignable capacity at the seventh grade level. Instead of the 450 seats at the $7^{\text {th }}$ grade that have been available during the prior two years, a capacity of 300 was established in order to
have enough room to house three grades as opposed to the two grades that are currently housed in Flinn, Eisenhower, Lincoln, and West Middle Schools.
2. The capacity at the sixth grade also had to be established at 300 in order to accommodate the impact of the reconfiguration. Without reducing seats at the $7^{\text {th }}$ grade and establishing an assignable capacity of 300 at the $6^{\text {th }}$ grade the enrollment in these schools would have exceeded the program capacity in these schools.
3. The possible retention rate of current middle school students is a factor in reducing first choice assignments. The retention rate is anticipated to approach 8 percent, further limiting the number of seats available for the assignment of the incoming $6^{\text {th }}$ and 7 th grade students.

## Grade 6 Assignments

As shown in Table A, the Department of Desegregation assigned a total of 1,790 students to a Grade 6 school for the 1999-2000 school year. Of these newly assigned Grade 6 students, 1,075 or $60.1 \%$ are desegregation majority and 715 or $39.9 \%$ are desegregation minority. At this time, approximately $91 \%$ of the projected Grade 6 students have been assigned for the next school year, including 1,749 who were early assigned primarily to a school of choice and 41 late applicants.

## Early Assignments

- The Department of Desegregation has Early assigned 1,749 students to a Grade 6 school for the 1999-2000 school year. As shown in Table A, 1,055 or $60.3 \%$ of these students are desegregation majority and 694 or $39.7 \%$ are desegregation minority.
- Overall, $97.1 \%$ of the students were assigned to a school of choice, only $2.9 \%$ were administrative assigned, and $81.6 \%$ were assigned to their first choice school.
- $90.7 \%$ of the students were assigned to their first or second choice schools.
- 111 students were assigned to the Gifted Program at West Middle School. Of these students 71 or $64 \%$ are desegregation majority, and 40 or $36 \%$ are desegregation minority, which is $5 \%$ below the District minority grade 6 percentage of $41 \%$. The Gifted Program is not in compliance with the CRO at Grade 6.


## Late Assignments

- The Department of Desegregation also assigned 41 late applicants to a Grade 6 school for the 1999-2000 school year. Of these students, who applied late, only $26.8 \%$ were assigned to their first choice school as compared to $81.6 \%$ who applied early.
- Overall $85.4 \%$ were assigned to a school of choice, including $24.4 \%$ who received their second choice school, and $14.6 \%$ received administrative assignments as compared to any $2.9 \%$ who applied early.


## Grade 7 Assignments

The Department of Desegregation assigned a total of 1,840 students for a Grade 7 school for the 1999-2000 school year. Of these newly assigned Grade 7 students, 1,119 or $60.8 \%$ are desegregation majority and 721 or $39.2 \%$ are desegregation minority. At this time, approximately $93 \%$ of the projected Grade 7 students have been assigned, including 1,789 who were early assigned primarily to a school of choice and 51 late applicants

## Early Assignments

- As shown in Table B, the Department of Desegregation early assigned 1,789 students to a Grade 7 school for the 1999-2000 school year. Of the early assigned students 1,092 or $61 \%$ are desegregation majority and 697 or $39 \%$ are desegregation minority.
- Overall, $94.8 \%$ of the early Grade 7 applicants have been assigned to a school of choice, including $78.5 \%$ to their first choice school, $11.0 \%$ to their second choice and $5.3 \%$ to their third or fourth choice schools.
- As discussed above, only $78.5 \%$ of the early Grade 7 applicants were assigned to their first choice school, as compared to $89.6 \%$ in the current 1998-1999 school year. The 11\% decrease in first choice assignment is due primarily to Grade 7 retentions and the significant under selection of the Kennedy Middle School which received only 56 first choices.
- While the vast majority of students were early assigned to a school of choice, 94 or $5.2 \%$ received administrative assignments, including 47 desegregation majority students and 47 desegregation minority students.


## Late Assignments

- Table B indicates that 51 students who applied late were also assigned to Grade 7 schools for the 1999-2000 school year. Of those late applicants, 27 or $52.9 \%$ were desegregation majority and 24 or $47.1 \%$ were desegregation minority.
- Only $19.6 \%$ of the late applicants were assigned to their First choice school and $41.2 \%$ received administrative assignments.
