I, Lucy Lennox, declare and affirm as follows:

1. I am over the age of 18 and I am competent to testify. The statements of fact contained herein are based on my personal knowledge and belief.
2. I am a resident of the state of Washington.
3. On February 7, 2012, I visited the Prison Legal News website (www.prisonlegalnews.org) and printed multiple copies of the same legal article titled "Prison Legal News Files Censorship Suit Against Florida DOC" to send to 11 prisoners at the Columbia County Jail. I enclosed the printed articles in separate envelopes and sent them to specific prisoners at the Columbia County Jail in standard sized #10 envelopes with the required amount of postage affixed to each one.
4. I sent the website article to the following prisoners at the Columbia County Jail:

5. The Columbia County Jail rejected three of the articles I mailed and returned the rejected mailings to me, as described below:

A. Exhibit A is a true copy of the envelope and article that I mailed to Scott Lavelle on February 7, 2012. The Jail returned the envelope to me, unopened. The returned

envelope is stamped "RETURN TO SENDER." I did not receive a Prohibited Mail Notice or any other communication from the Columbia County Jail regarding the mail I sent to Mr. Lavelle or why the Jail rejected this envelope.

B. Exhibit B is a true copy of the envelope and article that I mailed to Alisha Vandolah on February 8, 2012. The Jail returned the envelope to me, unopened. The returned envelope is stamped and marked "INSPECTED BY COLUMBIA COUNTY JAIL," "RETURN TO SENDER," and "CONTRABAND."

C. Exhibit C is a true copy of the Prohibited Mail Notice dated February 11, 2012, that I received from the Columbia County Sheriff's Office regarding my mailing to Alisha Vandolah, and the envelope the notice arrived in. The envelope is postmarked February 14, 2012. The notice states that the Sheriff's Office "denied" my mail because "It is deemed personal mail and not on a postcard."

D. Exhibit D is a true copy of the envelope and article that I mailed to Shaughnessy Williams on February 8, 2012. The Jail returned the envelope to me, unopened. The returned envelope is stamped and marked "INSPECTED BY COLUMBIA COUNTY JAIL," "RETURN TO SENDER," and "CONTRABAND."

E. Exhibit E is a true copy of the Prohibited Mail Notice dated February 11, 2012, that I received from the Columbia County Sheriff's Office regarding my mailing to Shaughnessy Williams, and the envelope the notice arrived in. The envelope is postmarked February 14, 2012. The notice states that the Sheriff's Office "denied" my mail because "It is deemed personal mail and not on a postcard."


6. Prior to sending the mail described above in Paragraphs 3-4 I visited the Columbia County Sheriff's website in an attempt to learn about the Jail's Inmate Mail Policy and any restrictions on sending mail to prisoners. I clicked on "Inmate Mail" on the left-hand side of website's home page, but the mail policy was not posted. Instead, I found a notice that said the mail policy was "under review."

7. The two Prohibited Mail Notices I received, Exhibits D and E, directed me to “the jail’s web page at www.co.columbia.or.us/sheriff” to find information about the Jail’s mail policy. Therefore, I re-visited the site on March 1, 2012, but the website still had posted the same notice that the mail policy is “under review.” Exhibit F is a true copy of the notice I saw on the website. I was unable to locate the Columbia County Jail’s Mail Policy on the Sheriff’s website.

8. Other than the exhibits described above and attached to this declaration I have received no further communication from the Columbia County Jail. I do not know whether the Jail delivered or censored the other eight articles I sent to prisoners at the Columbia County Jail.

I declare under penalty of perjury of the laws of the State of Washington and the United States of America that the foregoing is true and correct to the best of my knowledge.

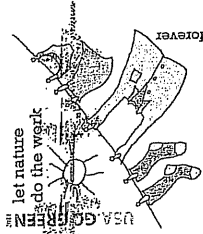

Prison Legal News Files Censorship Suit Against Florida DOC

On November 17, 2011 the ACLU of Florida and the Florida Justice Institute filed a lawsuit on behalf of Prison Legal News in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida. Named as defendants in the suit are Florida Dept. of Corrections (FDOC) Secretary Kenneth S. Tucker and FDOC wardens at the Everglades, Dade and Homestead Correctional Institutions.

According to the complaint, PLN accuses the FDOC of violating its rights under the First and Fourteenth Amendments by refusing to deliver its monthly publication and books to FDOC prisoners system-wide.

"When the government blocks information based on the content of that information, that's censorship," said Randall Marshall, Legal Director for the ACLU of Florida. "These publications provide inmates with vital information about their legal rights and individuals in FDOC custody have a right to access these publications."

Although PLN's articles and editorial content do not violate FDOC policies or regulations, PLN is being censored by Florida prison officials purportedly due to its advertisements – such as ads for pen-pal services and alternative prison phone services.

"The FDOC is imposing a blanket ban on all of PLN's publications, including our self-help books for prisoners, because they don't like some of our advertisers," said PLN editor Paul Wright. "We believe that is entirely pretextual and an unjustified, exaggerated response that is being used to uphold unconstitutional censorship in violation of the First Amendment."

"We're a national news publication," added PLN associate editor Alex Friedmann. "We can't tailor our ad content to one particular state. Florida's not banning Time or Newsweek because they have advertisers for cigarettes or cars, though prisoners aren't allowed to have those either."

The complaint asks the district court to find that the FDOC is censoring PLN's reading materials and failing to provide due process in violation of the First and Fourteenth Amendments, and also requests injunctive relief, attorney fees and costs.

"This illegal conduct by the FDOC is precisely the type of activity the First Amendment was meant to protect. It is why our country was founded in the first place, and the reason free speech and freedom of the press is in the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights," noted Randall Berg, lead counsel and President of the Florida Justice Institute.

PLN sued the FDOC in 2004 over similar censorship issues, and the FDOC changed its mail policy in 2005 to allow PLN to be distributed to Florida state prisoners. The district court dismissed the suit as being moot; the 11th Circuit affirmed, noting that the FDOC had "presented sufficient evidence to show that it has 'no intent to ban PLN based solely on the advertising content at issue in this case' in the future." [See: PLN, May 2011, p.10]. However, in 2009 the FDOC changed its mail policy again and began censoring PLN's publications, even though PLN's ad content had not changed.

"This is about as clear a case of censorship as there can be," stated ACLU of Florida Executive Director Howard Simon. "Government can't censor material just because it doesn't like what's being published in the material – in this case, advertisements for pen-pal services. Just because our client provides legal information for people who are incarcerated doesn't mean they forfeit their constitutional rights. INMATE MAIL GUIDE

Personal Mail

Inmates may send or receive personal mail from friends, family, or associates on postcards only. Inmates may receive postcards in any size that is delivered by the U.S. Postal Service up to a maximum size of 5-1/2" tall x 8-1/2" wide. Inmates may receive postcards with photographs on one side as allowed by the U.S. Postal Service. The jail does not permit any other form of personal mail for inmates.

Addressing Inmate Mail

Inmate mail must have the inmate's booking number as part of the addressee information. Incoming mail must have a return address to include the name and address of the sender.

Prohibited Mail

Jail staff will not allow an inmate to receive or send mail that—

1. Contains—
 - a. Threats of physical harm, blackmail, extortion, or other criminal activity.
 - b. Plans for escape, criminal activity, or activity that violates jail rules.
 - c. Gang-related material.
 - d. Information that, if conveyed, could result in physical harm to someone.
 - e. Sexually explicit materials
 - f. Inflammatory material
 - g. Contraband materials including but not limited to such commonly mailed items as:
 - (1) Books larger than 9 by 12 inches or with plastic or metal bindings
 - (2) More than three books in a single piece of mail
 - (3) Controlled substances as defined by ORS 475.525
 - (4) Foreign substances, such as:
 - (a) Bodily fluids
 - (b) Lipstick or perfume
 - (c) Glue or paint
 - (d) Anything with an unusual stain or odor that indicates a foreign substance may be present
2. Is written in code or suspected code
3. Was a form of written communication not sent through the USPS or other approved system
4. Is to or from a victim of a crime that the inmate is in custody for in either pretrial or sentenced status.
5. Would violate a court order.
6. May produce a hostile work environment, such as sexual harassment.
7. Is a credit or deferred billing transaction, such as "bill me later" subscriptions or merchandise bought on credit or collect-on-delivery terms.
8. Is fraudulently marked as legal or official mail.

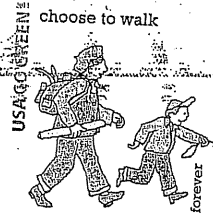

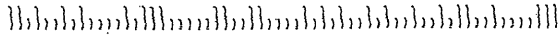

Prison Legal News Files Censorship Suit Against Florida DOC

On November 17, 2011 the ACLU of Florida and the Florida Justice Institute filed a lawsuit on behalf of Prison Legal News in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida. Named as defendants in the suit are Florida Dept. of Corrections (FDOC) Secretary Kenneth S. Tucker and FDOC wardens at the Everglades, Dade and Homestead Correctional Institutions.

According to the complaint, PLN accuses the FDOC of violating its rights under the First and Fourteenth Amendments by refusing to deliver its monthly publication and books to FDOC prisoners system-wide.

"When the government blocks information based on the content of that information, that's censorship," said Randall Marshall, Legal Director for the ACLU of Florida. "These publications provide inmates with vital information about their legal rights and individuals in FDOC custody have a right to access these publications."

Although PLN's articles and editorial content do not violate FDOC policies or regulations, PLN is being censored by Florida prison officials purportedly due to its advertisements – such as ads for pen-pal services and alternative prison phone services.

"The FDOC is imposing a blanket ban on all of PLN's publications, including our self-help books for prisoners, because they don't like some of our advertisers," said PLN editor Paul Wright. "We believe that is entirely pretextual and an unjustified, exaggerated response that is being used to uphold unconstitutional censorship in violation of the First Amendment."

"We're a national news publication," added PLN associate editor Alex Friedmann. "We can't tailor our ad content to one particular state. Florida's not banning Time or Newsweek because they have advertisers for cigarettes or cars, though prisoners aren't allowed to have those either."

The complaint asks the district court to find that the FDOC is censoring PLN's reading materials and failing to provide due process in violation of the First and Fourteenth Amendments, and also requests injunctive relief, attorney fees and costs.

"This illegal conduct by the FDOC is precisely the type of activity the First Amendment was meant to protect. It is why our country was founded in the first place, and the reason free speech and freedom of the press is in the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights," noted Randall Berg, lead counsel and President of the Florida Justice Institute.

PLN sued the FDOC in 2004 over similar censorship issues, and the FDOC changed its mail policy in 2005 to allow PLN to be distributed to Florida state prisoners. The district court dismissed the suit as being moot; the 11th Circuit affirmed, noting that the FDOC had "presented sufficient evidence to show that it has 'no intent to ban PLN based solely on the advertising content at issue in this case' in the future." [See: PLN, May 2011, p.10]. However, in 2009 the FDOC changed its mail policy again and began censoring PLN's publications, even though PLN's ad content had not changed.

"This is about as clear a case of censorship as there can be," stated ACLU of Florida Executive Director Howard Simon. "Government can't censor material just because it doesn't like what's being published in the material – in this case, advertisements for pen-pal services. Just because our client provides legal information for people who are incarcerated doesn't mean they forfeit their constitutional rights. The Department of Corrections doesn't have to like that fact, but they are obligated to respect it." See: Prison Legal News v. Mayo, U.S.D.C. (S.D. Fla.), Case No. 1:11-cv-24145-PAS.
