## Message from the Chief Freedom of Information Act Officer

I direct your attention to the report that follows and look forward to providing even better and more responsive customer service in the new year.

As has been the case for several years, DHS continues to receive the largest number of FOIA requests of any federal department or agency in each fiscal year (FY), receiving almost 30 percent of all requests received by the Federal Government. Since President Obama took office, DHS has experienced a 45 percent increase in the number of FOIA requests received. In FY 2009, DHS received 103,093 requests, which was already the largest volume of requests. That volume surged each year: 130,098 in FY 2010; 175,656 in FY 2011; and 190,589 in FY 2012. In FY 2013, DHS received a staggering 231,534 FOIA requests.



The volume of requests the Department receives may be due in large part to the interest of the public in DHS's mission and the function of its components. Of particular interest to the public are immigration-related records under the purview of U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), the Office of Biometric Identity Management (OBIM) within the National Protection and Program Directorate (NPPD), and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS). These components continue to receive the largest number of requests, receiving 97 percent of all requests in FY 2013.

As a result, DHS also has the largest backlog of pending FOIA requests. In last year's annual report, DHS highlighted a 33 percent decrease in the backlog. In FY 2013 however, the backlog increased from 28,553 to 53,598 due in part to the record-setting number of requests received. Components that process requests seeking immigration-related records (e.g., copies of the Alien File, entry/exit records, detention and deportation records) have the largest backlogs in the Department, with CBP, ICE, NPPD and USCIS comprising 95 percent of the total DHS backlog.

Notably, DHS enjoyed a successful year in closing out the department's ten oldest requests and appeals pending as posted in the FY 2012 report. In this past fiscal year, DHS closed 87 percent of last year's oldest component pending requests as reported in FY 2012. This includes closing all 10 of the oldest DHS agency-wide cases pending as of end of FY 2012. Additionally, DHS closed 86 percent of the 10 combined oldest component appeals pending as of end of FY 2012. This includes closing seven of the oldest DHS agency wide appeals pending as of end of FY 2012. Closing 87 percent of the ten oldest pending requests and 86 percent of the combined oldest component appeals pending represents a significant step not only toward reducing overall backlogs, but also to improving FOIA administration across DHS.

During this reporting period, DHS continues to take steps to enhance its FOIA program by focusing its efforts on eliminating the backlog of overdue requests, offering enhanced training opportunities, and deploying advanced technology. Additionally, the DHS Privacy Office initiated several actions to ensure policy compliance and provide oversight of FOIA processing within the components. DHS issued guidance on the application of Exemption 6, the posting of congressional correspondence logs, and the handling of fee waivers or claims of membership in a preferential fee category. Additionally, DHS monitored monthly and quarterly data processing statistics in its sustained effort toward closing the oldest requests. As a result, many components reported reducing their backlog of overdue requests. For example, USCIS reduced its backlog from 10,727 at the end of FY 2012 to 3,394 at the

end of FY 2013, a 68 percent reduction. DHS will continue to seek opportunities to improve the efficiency and cost-effectiveness of its FOIA operations.

I am proud of the great work our Department has accomplished.

2. Definition of terms, expressed in common terminology.

- a. **Administrative Appeal** – A request to a federal agency asking that it review at a higher administrative level a FOIA determination made by the agency at the initial request level.
- b. **Average Number** – The number obtained by dividing the sum of a group of numbers by the quantity of numbers in the group. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the average number is 8, determined by dividing 24 by 3.
- c. **Backlog** – The number of requests or administrative appeals that are pending at an agency at the end of the fiscal year that are beyond the statutory time period for a response.
- d. **Component** – For agencies that process requests on a decentralized basis, a “component” is an entity, also sometimes referred to as an Office, Division, Bureau, Center, or Directorate, within the agency that processes FOIA requests. The FOIA now requires that agencies include in the Annual FOIA Report data for both the agency overall and for each principal component of the agency.
- e. **Consultation** – The procedure whereby the agency responding to a FOIA request first forwards a record to another agency for its review because that other agency has an interest in the document. Once the agency in receipt of the consultation finishes its review of the record, it provides its views on the record to the agency that forwarded it. That agency, in turn, will then respond to the FOIA requester.
- f. **Exemption 3 Statute** – A federal statute other than FOIA that exempts information from disclosure and which the agency relies on to withhold information under subsection (b)(3) of the FOIA.\*

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\* Pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(3) as amended by sec. 564 of Public Law 111-83, a statute enacted after

- g. **FOIA Request** – A FOIA request is generally a request to a federal agency for access to records concerning another person (i.e., a “third-party” request), an organization, or a particular topic of interest. Moreover, because requesters covered by the Privacy Act who seek records concerning themselves (i.e., “first-party” requesters) are afforded the benefit of the access provisions of both FOIA and the Privacy Act, the term “FOIA request” also includes any such “first-party” requests when an agency determines that it must search beyond its Privacy Act “systems of records” or when the agency applies a Privacy Act exemption and therefore looks to FOIA to afford the greatest possible access. DHS applies this same interpretation of the term “FOIA request” even to “first-party” requests from persons not covered by the Privacy Act, e.g., non-U.S. citizens, because DHS by policy provides such persons the ability to access their own records in DHS’s Privacy Act “mixed systems of records” as if they are subject to the Privacy Act’s access provisions, and DHS processes the requests under FOIA as well. Thus, all requests that require DHS to utilize FOIA in responding to the requester are included in this Report.)

Additionally, a FOIA request includes records referred to the agency for processing and direct response to the requester. It does not, however, include records for which the agency has received a consultation from another agency. (Consultations are reported separately in Section XII of this Report.)

- h. **Full Grant** – An agency decision to disclose all records in full in response to FOIA request.
- i. **Full Denial** – An agency decision not to release any records in response to a FOIA request because the records are exempt in their entirety under one or more of the FOIA exemptions, or because of a procedural reason, such as when no records could be located.
- j. **Median Number** – The middle, not average, number. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the median number is 7.
- k. **Multi-Track Processing** – A system in which simple requests requiring relatively minimal review are placed in one processing track and more voluminous and complex requests are placed in one or more other tracks. Requests granted expedited processing are placed in yet another track. Requests in each track are processed on a first in/first out basis.
- i. **Expedited Processing** – An agency will process a FOIA request on an expedited basis when a requester satisfies the requirements for expedited processing as set forth in the statute and in agency regulations.

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October 28, 2009, can qualify as an Exemption 3 law only if it cites specifically to 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(3).

- ii. **Simple Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in its fastest (non-expedited) track based on the volume and/or simplicity of records requested.
    - iii. **Complex Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in a slower track based on the high volume and/or complexity of the records requested.
  - l. **Partial Grant/Partial Denial** – An agency decision to disclose portions of the records and to withhold other portions that are exempt under the FOIA, or to otherwise deny a portion of the request for a procedural reason.
  - m. **Pending Request or Pending Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has not taken final action in all respects.
  - n. **Perfected Request** – A request for records that reasonably describes such records and is made in accordance with published rules stating the time, place, fees (if any) and procedures to be followed.
  - o. **Processed Request or Processed Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has taken final action in all respects.
  - p. **Range in Number of Days** – The lowest and highest number of days to process requests or administrative appeals
  - q. **Time Limits** – The time period in the statute for an agency to respond to a FOIA request (ordinarily 20 working days from receipt of a perfected FOIA request.)

## **APPENDIX A: Composition of the Department of Homeland Security**

The Office of the Secretary oversees Department of Homeland Security (DHS) efforts to counter terrorism and enhance security, secure and manage our borders while facilitating trade and travel, enforce and administer our immigration laws, safeguard and secure cyberspace, build resilience to disasters, and provide essential support for national and economic security - in coordination with federal, state, local, international, tribal and private sector partners.

### **Offices:**

The Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman (CISOMB) provides recommendations for resolving individual and employer problems with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services in order to ensure national security and the integrity of the legal immigration system.

The Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) supports the Department as it secures the Nation while preserving individual liberty, fairness, and equality under the law.

The Office of the Executive Secretariat (ESEC) assures the accurate and timely dissemination of information and written communications from throughout the Department and our homeland security partners to and from the Secretary and Deputy Secretary.

The Office of Intergovernmental Affairs (IGA) promotes an integrated national approach to homeland security by ensuring, coordinating, and advancing federal interaction with state, local, tribal, and territorial governments.

The Military Advisor's Office advises on facilitating, coordinating, and executing policy, procedures, preparedness activities, and operations between the Department and the Department of Defense.

The Office of the General Counsel (OGC) integrates approximately 1700 lawyers from throughout the Department comprised of a headquarters office with subsidiary divisions and the legal programs for eight Department components.

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) conducts independent and objective inspections, audits, and investigations to provide oversight and promote excellence, integrity, and accountability in DHS programs and operations.

The Office of Legislative Affairs (OLA) serves as primary liaison to members of Congress and their staffs.

The Office of Public Affairs (OPA) coordinates the public affairs activities of all of the Department's components and offices.

The Privacy Office (PRIV) works to preserve and enhance privacy protections for all individuals and to promote transparency of Department operations.

#### Department Components and Directorates:

United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is responsible for securing the border against all transnational threats and facilitating trade and travel while enforcing hundreds of U.S. regulations, including immigration and drug laws.

The Domestic Nuclear Detection Office (DNDO) works to enhance the nuclear detection efforts of federal, state, territorial, tribal, and local governments, and the private sector and to ensure a coordinated response to such threats.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) supports our citizens and first responders to ensure that as a nation we work together to build, sustain, and improve our capability to prepare for, protect against, respond to, recover from, and mitigate all hazards.

The Federal Law Enforcement Training Centers (FLETC) mission is "We train those who protect our homeland." To carry out this mission, the FLETC serves as an interagency law enforcement training organization for 91 federal agencies or Partner Organizations. The FLETC also provides training to state, local, rural, tribal, territorial, and international law enforcement agencies.

The Office of Intelligence and Analysis (I&A) is responsible for equipping the Homeland Security Enterprise with the information and intelligence it needs to keep the United States safe, secure, and resilient.

United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) promotes homeland security and public safety through the criminal and civil enforcement of federal laws governing border control, customs, trade, and immigration.

The Management Directorate provides Department-wide leadership and direction on the full spectrum of management issues. These efforts include integrating common operating standards; managing the Department's delegations and directives; leading investment and portfolio management; and administering six functional lines of business, which are financial management, human resources, facilities and logistics, information technology, security and procurement.

The Directorate for National Protection and Programs (NPPD) leads the national effort to protect and enhance the resilience of the Nation's physical and cyber infrastructure.

The Office of Health Affairs (OHA) coordinates all medical activities of the Department of Homeland Security to ensure appropriate preparation for and response to incidents having medical significance.

The Office of Operations Coordination and Planning (OPS) provides decision support and enables the execution of homeland security responsibilities across the enterprise; promotes situational awareness and information sharing; integrates and synchronizes strategic operations and planning; and administers the DHS continuity program.

The Office of Policy (PLCY) develops Department-wide policies, programs and planning to promote and ensure quality, consistency and integration across all homeland security missions.

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) protects the nation's transportation systems to ensure freedom of movement for people and commerce.

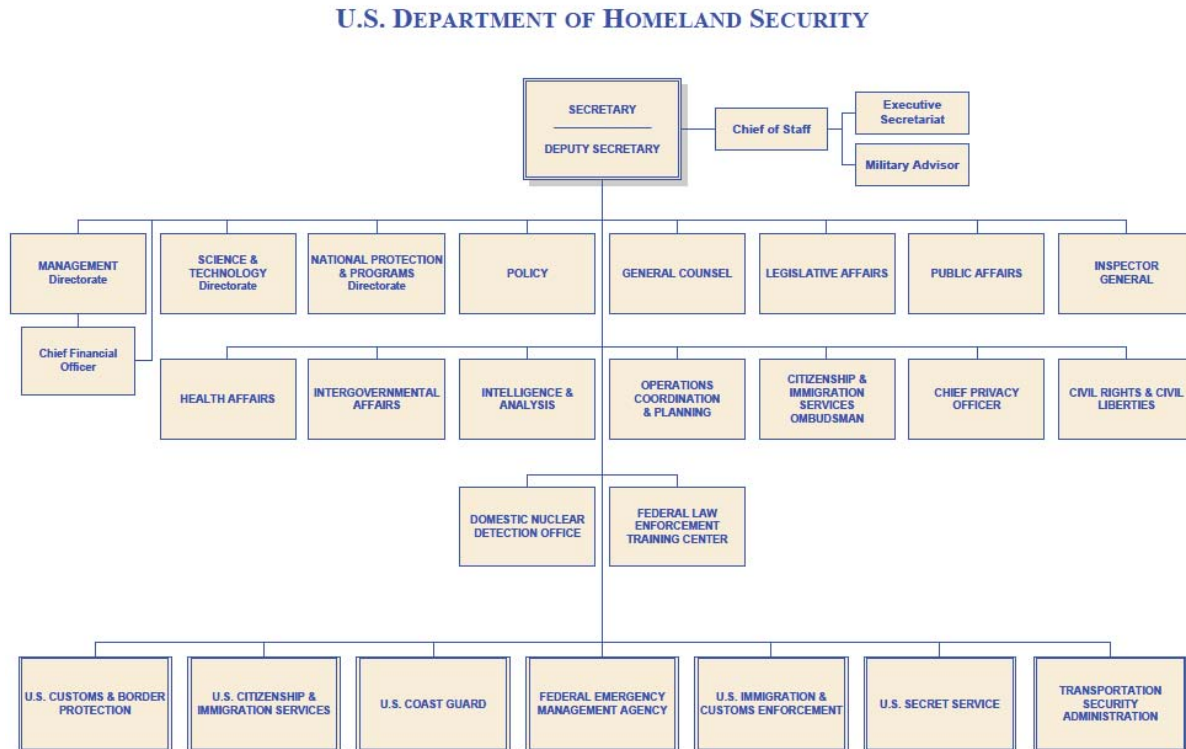

## Message from the Acting Chief Freedom of Information Act Officer

I am pleased to present the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS or Department) *Annual Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Report to the Attorney General for 2012*. This is the first report produced during my tenure as the Department's Acting Chief Privacy Officer and Acting Chief FOIA Officer and the fourth to reflect President Obama's call for openness and transparency in Federal Government operations. This report highlights the unprecedented number of FOIA requests and appeals the Department received this fiscal year, and the sizable reduction of its backlog of requests and appeals.



DHS receives the largest number of FOIA requests of any federal department or agency in each fiscal year (FY). It also has the largest backlog of pending FOIA requests. Since President Obama took office, DHS has experienced a steady annual increase in the number of FOIA requests from 103,093 in FY 2009, to 130,098 in FY 2010, to 175,656 in FY 2011. This trend continued in FY 2012: DHS received a record-setting 190,589 requests, an 85 percent increase over FY 2009. Despite this increase during FY 2012, DHS processed 205,895 requests and reduced its backlog of pending requests from 42,371 to 28,553. This decrease in the backlog is even more significant since the Department closed over 47,000 more perfected requests that were placed in the complex track in FY 2012 than in FY 2011. In fact, 55 percent of all closed requests in FY 2012 were complex compared to only 44 percent in FY 2011.

The 33 percent decrease in the backlog this year, despite an increasing volume of requests, was due to the multi-pronged efforts of all components. DHS took several steps to reduce the FOIA backlog including the use of the business management strategy Six Sigma, student interns, and contractors, as well as detailing FOIA Specialists in Headquarters to the components needing assistance to reduce their backlog. Additionally, the DHS Privacy Office (or Office) met with component FOIA Officers and FOIA officials from other federal agencies to gain insight into how technology, training, and staff development can converge to reduce the backlog, particularly through day-to-day case management.

DHS also made great strides in processing FOIA appeals. Although DHS experienced a 20 percent increase in the number of FOIA appeals received in FY 2012 compared with FY 2011, the appeals backlog decreased by 50 percent, from 327 in FY 2011 to 165 in FY 2012. DHS also decreased the average processing time to close out an appeal by 56 percent, from 106 days in FY 2011 to 47 days in FY 2012. Almost every DHS component shortened the interval between the receipt of an appeal and the closing of an appeal. For example, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) received 58 percent of the Department's FOIA appeals, but was successful in reducing the average response time for appeals by 53 percent, from 52 days in FY 2011 to 24 days in FY 2012. The Office of the General Counsel (OGC) decreased its average turnaround by 60 percent, from 700 days to 278 days, while the average response time for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) dropped by 30 percent, from 40 days to 28 days.

I am proud of the great work our Department has accomplished. I direct your attention to the pages that follow and look forward to providing even better and more responsive customer service in the new year.

The Department commonly invokes exemptions 6 and 7(C) to prevent unwarranted injury to the privacy interests of individuals, and exemption 7(E) to protect against the disclosure of law enforcement techniques, procedures, and guidelines.

2. Definition of terms, expressed in common terminology.

- a. **Administrative Appeal** – A request to a federal agency asking that it review at a higher administrative level a FOIA determination made by the agency at the initial request level.
- b. **Average Number** – The number obtained by dividing the sum of a group of numbers by the quantity of numbers in the group. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the average number is 8, determined by dividing 24 by 3.
- c. **Backlog** – The number of requests or administrative appeals that are pending at an agency at the end of the fiscal year that are beyond the statutory time period for a response.
- d. **Component** – For agencies that process requests on a decentralized basis, a “component” is an entity, also sometimes referred to as an Office, Division, Bureau, Center, or Directorate, within the agency that processes FOIA requests. The FOIA now requires that agencies include in the Annual FOIA Report data for both the agency overall and for each principal component of the agency.
- e. **Consultation** – The procedure whereby the agency responding to a FOIA requests first forwards a record to another agency for its review because that other agency has an interest in the document. Once the agency in receipt of the consultation finishes its review of the record, it provides its views on the record to the agency that forwarded it. That agency, in turn, will then respond to the FOIA requester.

- f. **Exemption 3 Statute** – A federal statute other than FOIA that exempts information from disclosure and which the agency relies on to withhold information under subsection (b)(3) of the FOIA.\*
- g. **FOIA Request** – A FOIA request is generally a request to a federal agency for access to records concerning another person (i.e., a “third-party” request), an organization, or a particular topic of interest. Moreover, because requesters covered by the Privacy Act who seek records concerning themselves (i.e., “first-party” requesters) are afforded the benefit of the access provisions of both FOIA and the Privacy Act, the term “FOIA request” also includes any such “first-party” requests where an agency determines that it must search beyond its Privacy Act “systems of records” or where the agency applies a Privacy Act exemption and therefore looks to FOIA to afford the greatest possible access. DHS applies this same interpretation of the term “FOIA request” even to “first-party” requests from persons not covered by the Privacy Act, e.g., non-U.S. citizens, because DHS by policy provides such persons the ability to access their own records in DHS’s Privacy Act “mixed systems of records” as if they are subject to the Privacy Act’s access provisions, and DHS processes the requests under FOIA as well. Thus, all requests that require DHS to utilize FOIA in responding to the requester are included in this Report.

Additionally, a FOIA request includes records referred to the agency for processing and direct response to the requester. It does not, however, include records for which the agency has received a consultation from another agency. (Consultations are reported separately in Section XII of this Report.

- h. **Full Grant** – An agency decision to disclose all records in full in response to FOIA request.
- i. **Full Denial** – An agency decision not to release any records in response to a FOIA request because the records are exempt in their entirety under one or more of the FOIA exemptions, or because of a procedural reason, such as when no records could be located.
- j. **Median Number** – The middle, not average, number. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the median number is 7.
- k. **Multi-Track Processing** – A system in which simple requests requiring relatively minimal review are placed in one processing track and more voluminous and complex requests are placed in one or more other tracks. Requests granted expedited processing are placed in yet another track. Requests in each track are processed on a first in/first out basis.

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\* Pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(3) as amended by sec. 564 of Public Law 111-83, a statute enacted after October 28, 2009, can qualify as an Exemption 3 law only if it cites specifically to 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(3).



- i. **Expedited Processing** – An agency will process a FOIA request on an expedited basis when a requester satisfies the requirements for expedited processing as set forth in the statute and in agency regulations.
    - ii. **Simple Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in its fastest (non-expedited) track based on the volume and/or simplicity of records requested.
    - iii. **Complex Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in a slower track based on the high volume and/or complexity of the records requested.
  - l. **Partial Grant/Partial Denial** – An agency decision to disclose portions of the records and to withhold other portions that are exempt under the FOIA, or to otherwise deny a portion of the request for a procedural reason.
  - m. **Pending Request or Pending Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has not taken final action in all respects.
  - n. **Perfected Request** – A request for records which reasonably describes such records and is made in accordance with published rules stating the time, place, fees (if any) and procedures to be followed.
  - o. **Processed Request or Processed Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has taken final action in all respects.
  - p. **Range in Number of Days** – The lowest and highest number of days to process requests or administrative appeals
  - q. **Time Limits** – The time period in the statute for an agency to respond to a FOIA request (ordinarily 20 working days from receipt of a perfected FOIA request).

- a. **Exemption 1:** classified national defense and foreign relations information

## **APPENDIX A: Composition of the Department of Homeland Security**

The Office of the Secretary oversees Department of Homeland Security (DHS) efforts to counter terrorism and enhance security, secure and manage our borders while facilitating trade and travel, enforce and administer our immigration laws, safeguard and secure cyberspace, build resilience to disasters, and provide essential support for national and economic security - in coordination with federal, state, local, international, tribal and private sector partners.

### **Offices:**

The Privacy Office (PRIV) works to preserve and enhance privacy protections for all individuals and to promote transparency of Department operations.

The Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) provides legal and policy advice to Department leadership on civil rights and civil liberties issues, investigates and resolves complaints, and provides leadership to Equal Employment Opportunity Programs.

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) is responsible for conducting and supervising audits, investigations, and inspections relating to the programs and operations of the Department, and recommends ways for the Department to carry out its responsibilities in the most effective, efficient, and economical manner possible.

The Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman (CISOMB) provides recommendations for resolving individual and employer problems with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services in order to ensure national security and the integrity of the legal immigration system.

The Office of Legislative Affairs (OLA) serves as primary liaison to members of Congress and their staffs.

The Office of the General Counsel (OGC) integrates approximately 1700 lawyers from throughout the Department comprised of a headquarters office with subsidiary divisions and the legal programs for eight Department components.

The Office of Public Affairs (OPA) coordinates the public affairs activities of all of the Department's components and offices.

The Office of the Executive Secretariat (ESEC) assures the accurate and timely dissemination of information and written communications from throughout the Department and our homeland security partners to and from the Secretary and Deputy Secretary.

The Military Advisor's Office advises on facilitating, coordinating, and executing policy, procedures, preparedness activities, and operations between the Department and the Department of Defense.

The Office of Intergovernmental Affairs (IGA) promotes an integrated national approach to homeland security by ensuring, coordinating, and advancing federal interaction with state, local, tribal, and territorial governments.

Department Components and Directorates:

The Directorate for National Protection and Programs (NPPD) leads the national effort to protect and enhance the resilience of the Nation's physical and cyber infrastructure.

The Directorate for Science and Technology (S&T) strengthens America's security and resiliency by providing knowledge products and innovative technology solutions for the Homeland Security Enterprise.

The Directorate for Management (MGMT) is responsible for Department budgets and appropriations, expenditure of funds, accounting and finance, procurement, human resources, information technology systems, facilities and equipment, and the identification and tracking of performance measurements.

The Office of Policy (PLCY) develops Department-wide policies, programs and planning to promote and ensure quality, consistency and integration across all homeland security missions.

The Office of Health Affairs (OHA) coordinates all medical activities of the Department of Homeland Security to ensure appropriate preparation for and response to incidents having medical significance.

The Office of Intelligence and Analysis (I&A) is responsible for equipping the Homeland Security Enterprise with the information and intelligence it needs to keep the United States safe, secure, and resilient.

The Office of Operations Coordination and Planning (OPS) provides Departmental Leadership situational awareness, promotes information sharing, integrates and synchronizes strategic operations and planning, and administers the DHS continuity program.

The Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) provides career-long training to law enforcement professionals to help them fulfill their responsibilities safely and proficiently.

The Domestic Nuclear Detection Office (DNDO) works to enhance the nuclear detection efforts of federal, state, territorial, tribal, and local governments, and the private sector and to ensure a coordinated response to such threats.

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) protects the nation's transportation systems to ensure secure freedom of movement for people and commerce.



United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is responsible for securing the border against all transnational threats and facilitating trade and travel while enforcing hundreds of U.S. regulations, including immigration and drug laws.

United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) grants immigration and citizenship benefits, promotes awareness and understanding of citizenship, and ensures the integrity of our immigration system.

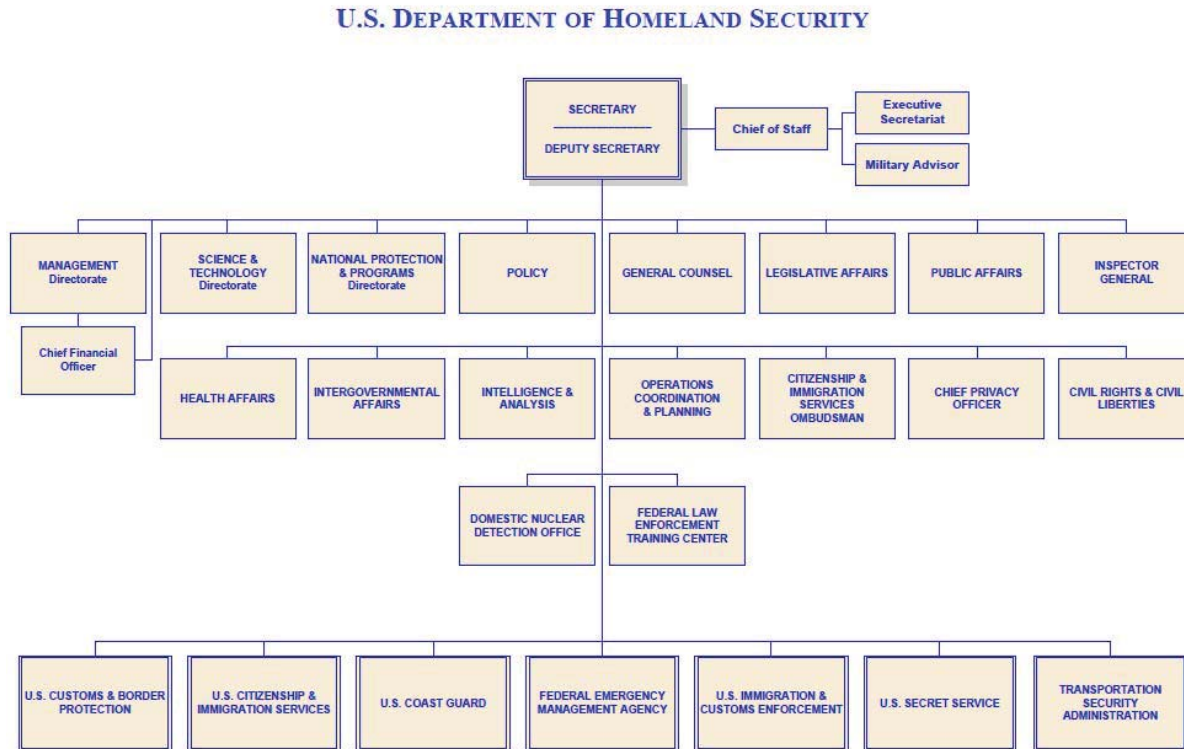

## Message from the Chief Freedom of Information Act Officer

I am delighted to present the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Annual Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) Report to the Attorney General for 2011. This is the third such report produced during my tenure as the Department's Chief Privacy Officer and Chief FOIA Officer and the third to reflect President Obama's call for openness and transparency in Federal Government operations. The highlight of this year's report is the unprecedented number of FOIA requests the Department received overall, the near doubling of requests submitted to two DHS components, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), and an additional 20 percent increase in requests coming in to United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), the DHS component that receives the most FOIA requests.



To analyze these numbers more closely, in Fiscal Year 2011 DHS received a total of 175,656 FOIA requests, up 45,558 or 35 percent from Fiscal Year 2010's total of 130,098. We processed 145,631 requests, an increase from 138,651 in 2010. These requests were almost equally divided between simple requests (requests anticipated to involve a small volume of material or which will be able to be processed relatively quickly) and complex requests (requests that are anticipated to involve a voluminous amount of material to review or will be time-consuming to process). We received 64,895 simple requests and 64,792 complex requests, respectively. For 98,401 of these cases (57 percent), DHS released responsive information. The percentage of FOIA requests with information released is even higher—81 percent—when the 17,731 requests that are duplicative or withdrawn altogether and/or seek records that do not exist or, alternatively, fall under the purview of another agency are eliminated.

The increased volume of incoming requests did not preclude a timely response. Almost across the board, DHS components shortened the interval between the receipt of a simple perfected request and its final disposition. CBP, for example, reduced its median response time for simple perfected requests from 24 days in FY10 to 4 in FY11 or 83 percent. The Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) decreased its median turnaround from 22 days to 7 or 68 percent, while the Office of Inspector General average response time dropped from 11.05 days to 8.57, or 22 percent. In some cases, the response time for complex requests also fell significantly. The Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA)'s response time dropped from 390 days in Fiscal Year 2010 to 102 in Fiscal Year 2011 or 74 percent. The United States Coast Guard (USCG) cut its response time from 56 days to 45 (20 percent), and the Office of General Counsel reduced its average response time of 474.57 days in FY10 to 296.69 in FY11— 37 percent.

Here at DHS we have experienced a 64 percent increase in the number of FOIA requests received since President Obama took Office and called for greater transparency and openness. What do these numbers mean in terms of the President's mandate? It is clear that the concepts of government accountability through the Freedom of Information Act that the President expressed upon assuming office has gained widespread acceptance among the public, that they are turning

first to the FOIA process to seek information about federal activities and using the full power of the law to find out what they want, perhaps need, to know. Certainly this is the case at DHS, where we celebrate this development to better acquaint our constituency with the panoply of programs and activities we carry out on their behalf.

I direct your attention to the pages that follow and look forward to providing even better and more responsive customer service in the new Fiscal Year.

2. Brief description why requests are not granted:

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS or the Department) has the primary responsibility to lead the unified national effort to secure the country and preserve our freedoms. It follows that the records maintained by the Department often involve law enforcement matters. Because law enforcement records are of such interest to subjects of investigation, victims of crime, and the public at large, these records are often requested under the Freedom of Information Act. The Department commonly invokes exemptions 6 and 7(C) to prevent unwarranted injury to the privacy interests of individuals, and exemption 7(E) to protect against the disclosure of law enforcement techniques, procedures and guidelines. Further, until the issuance of *Milner v. Department of the Navy*, 131 S.Ct. 1259 (2011), in March of this year, the Department commonly cited exemption 2 to protect against disclosure of certain types of information the release of which is likely to risk circumvention of laws or regulations.

2. Definition of terms, expressed in common terminology.

- a. **Administrative Appeal** – A request to a federal agency asking that it review at a higher administrative level a FOIA determination made by the agency at the initial request level.
- b. **Average Number** – The number obtained by dividing the sum of a group of numbers by the quantity of numbers in the group. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the average number is 8, determined by dividing 24 by 3.
- c. **Backlog** – The number of requests or administrative appeals that are pending at an agency at the end of the fiscal year that are beyond the statutory time period for a response.
- d. **Component** – For agencies that process requests on a decentralized basis, a “component” is an entity, also sometimes referred to as an Office, Division, Bureau, Center, or Directorate, within the agency that processes FOIA requests. The FOIA now requires that agencies include in the Annual FOIA Report data for both the agency overall and for each principal component of the agency.
- e. **Consultation** – The procedure whereby the agency responding to a FOIA requests first forwards a record to another agency for its review because that other agency has an interest in the document. Once the agency in receipt of the consultation finishes its review of the record, it provided its views on the record to

the agency that forwarded it. That agency, in turn, will then respond to the FOIA requester.

- f. **Exemption 3 Statute** – A federal statute other than FOIA that exempts information from disclosure and which the agency relies on to withhold information under subsection (b)(3) of the FOIA.\*
  - g. **FOIA Request** – A FOIA request is generally a request to a federal agency for access to records concerning another person (i.e., a “third-party” request), an organization, or a particular topic of interest. Moreover, because requesters covered by the Privacy Act who seek records concerning themselves (i.e., “first-party” requesters) are afforded the benefit of the access provisions of both FOIA and the Privacy Act, the term “FOIA request” also includes any such “first-party” requests where an agency determines that it must search beyond its Privacy Act “systems of records” or where the agency applies a Privacy Act exemption and therefore looks to FOIA to afford the greatest possible access. DHS applies this same interpretation of the term “FOIA request” even to “first-party” requests from persons not covered by the Privacy Act, e.g., non-U.S. citizens, because DHS by policy provides such persons the ability to access their own records in DHS’s Privacy Act “mixed systems of records” as if they are subject to the Privacy Act’s access provisions, and DHS processes the requests under FOIA as well. Thus, all requests that require DHS to utilize FOIA in responding to the requester are included in this Report.
- Additionally, a FOIA request includes records referred to the agency for processing and direct response to the requester. It does not, however, include records for which the agency has received a consultation from another agency. (Consultations are reported separately in Section XII of this Report.
- h. **Full Grant** – An agency decision to disclose all records in full in response to a FOIA request.
  - i. **Full Denial** – An agency decision not to release any records in response to a FOIA request because the records are exempt in their entirety under one or more of the FOIA exemptions, or because of a procedural reason, such as when no records could be located.
  - j. **Median Number** – The middle, not average, number. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the median number is 7.
  - k. **Multi-Track Processing** – A system in which simple requests requiring relatively minimal review are placed in one processing track and more voluminous and complex requests are placed in one or more other tracks. Requests granted

expedited processing are placed in yet another track. Requests in each track are processed on a first in/first out basis.

- i. **Expedited Processing** – An agency will process a FOIA request on an expedited basis when a requester satisfies the requirements for expedited processing as set forth in the statute and in agency regulations.
    - ii. **Simple Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in its fastest (non-expedited) track based on the volume and/or simplicity of records requested.
    - iii. **Complex Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in a slower track based on the high volume and/or complexity of the records requested.
  - l. **Partial Grant/Partial Denial** – An agency decision to disclose portions of the records and to withhold other portions that are exempt under the FOIA, or to otherwise deny a portion of the request for a procedural reason.
  - m. **Pending Request or Pending Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has not taken final action in all respects.
  - n. **Perfected Request** – A request for records which reasonably describes such records and is made in accordance with published rules stating the time, place, fees (if any) and procedures to be followed.
  - o. **Processed Request or Processed Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has taken final action in all respects.
  - p. **Range in Number of Days** – The lowest and highest number of days to process requests or administrative appeals
  - q. **Time limits** – The time period in the statute for an agency to respond to a FOIA request (ordinarily 20 working days from receipt of a perfected FOIA request).

## **APPENDIX A: Composition of the Department of Homeland Security**

The Office of the Secretary oversees Department of Homeland Security (DHS) efforts to counter terrorism and enhance security, secure and manage our borders while facilitating trade and travel, enforce and administer our immigration laws, safeguard and secure cyberspace, build resilience to disasters, and provide essential support for national and economic security - in coordination with federal, state, local, international, tribal and private sector partners.

### **Offices:**

The Privacy Office (PRIV) works to preserve and enhance privacy protections for all individuals, to promote transparency of Department operations, and to serve as a leader in the federal privacy community.

The Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) provides legal and policy advice to Department leadership on civil rights and civil liberties issues, investigates and resolves complaints, and provides leadership to Equal Employment Opportunity Programs.

The Office of Inspector General is responsible for conducting and supervising audits, investigations, and inspections relating to the programs and operations of the Department, recommending ways for the Department to carry out its responsibilities in the most effective, efficient, and economical manner possible.

The Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman provides recommendations for resolving individual and employer problems with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services in order to ensure national security and the integrity of the legal immigration system, increase efficiencies in administering citizenship and immigration services, and improve customer service.

The Office of Legislative Affairs serves as primary liaison to members of Congress and their staffs, the White House and Executive Branch, and to other federal agencies and governmental entities that have roles in assuring national security.

The Office of the General Counsel integrates approximately 1700 lawyers from throughout the Department into an effective, client-oriented, full-service legal team and comprises a headquarters office with subsidiary divisions and the legal programs for eight Department components. The Office of the General Counsel includes the ethics division for the Department.

The Office of Public Affairs coordinates the public affairs activities of all of the Department's components and offices, and serves as the federal government's lead public information office during a national emergency or disaster. Led by the Assistant Secretary for Public Affairs, it comprises the press office, incident and strategic communications, speechwriting, Web content management, and employee communications.

The Office of Counternarcotics Enforcement (CNE) coordinates policy and operations to stop the entry of illegal drugs into the United States, and to track and sever the connections between illegal drug trafficking and terrorism.

The Office of the Executive Secretariat (ESEC) provides all manner of direct support to the Secretary and Deputy Secretary, as well as related support to leadership and management across the Department. This support takes many forms, the most well known being accurate and timely dissemination of information and written communications from throughout the Department and our homeland security partners to the Secretary and Deputy Secretary.

The Military Advisor's Office advises on facilitating, coordinating, and executing policy, procedures, preparedness activities, and operations between the Department and the Department of Defense.

Office of Intergovernmental Affairs (IGA): IGA has the mission of promoting an integrated national approach to homeland security by ensuring, coordinating, and advancing federal interaction with state, local, tribal, and territorial governments.

#### Department Components and Directorates:

The Directorate for National Protection and Programs (NPPD) leads the national effort to protect and enhance the resilience of the Nation's physical and cyber infrastructure.

The Directorate for Science and Technology is the primary research and development arm of the Department. It provides federal, state, and local officials with the technology and capabilities to protect the homeland.

The Directorate for Management is responsible for Department budgets and appropriations, expenditure of funds, accounting and finance, procurement; human resources, information technology systems, facilities and equipment, and the identification and tracking of performance measurements.

The Office of Policy is the primary policy formulation and coordination component for the Department of Homeland Security. It provides a centralized, coordinated focus to the development of Department-wide, long-range planning to protect the United States.

The Office of Health Affairs coordinates all medical activities of the Department of Homeland Security to ensure appropriate preparation for and response to incidents having medical significance.

The Office of Intelligence and Analysis (I&A) is responsible for using information and intelligence from multiple sources to identify and assess current and future threats to the United States.

The Office of Operations Coordination and Planning (OPS) provides decision support and enables the Secretary's execution of responsibilities across the homeland security enterprise by promoting situational awareness and information sharing, integrating and synchronizing strategic operations and planning, and administering the DHS continuity program.

The Federal Law Enforcement Training Center provides career-long training to law enforcement professionals to help them fulfill their responsibilities safely and proficiently.

The Domestic Nuclear Detection Office works to enhance the nuclear detection efforts of federal, state, territorial, tribal, and local governments, and the private sector and to ensure a coordinated response to such threats.

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) protects the nation's transportation systems to ensure freedom of movement for people and commerce.

United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is one of the Department of Homeland Security's largest and most complex components, with a priority mission of keeping terrorists and their weapons out of the U.S. It also has a responsibility for securing and facilitating trade and travel while enforcing hundreds of U.S. regulations, including immigration and drug laws.

United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) secures America's promise as a nation of immigrants by providing accurate and useful information to our customers, granting immigration and citizenship benefits, promoting an awareness and understanding of citizenship, and ensuring the integrity of our immigration system.

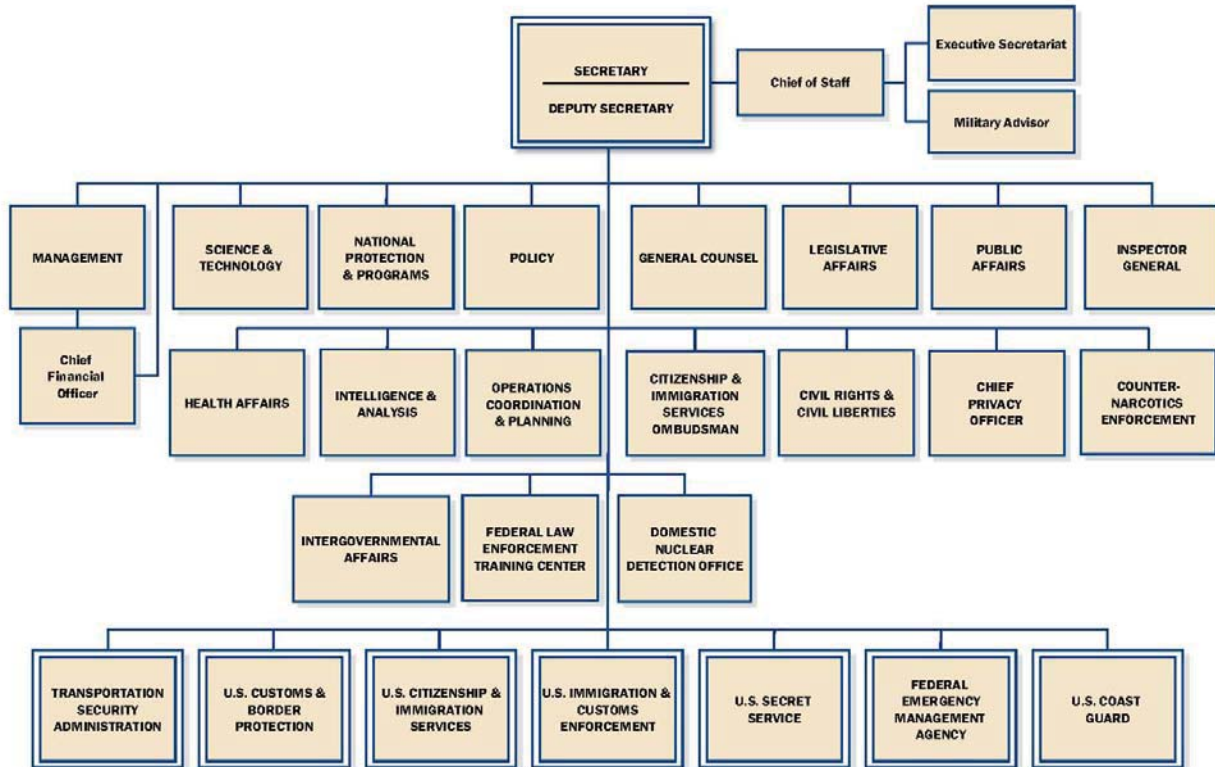
United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), promotes homeland security and public safety through the criminal and civil enforcement of federal laws governing border control, customs, trade, and immigration.

The United States Coast Guard is one of the five armed forces of the United States and the only military organization within the Department of Homeland Security. The Coast Guard protects the maritime economy and the environment, defends our maritime borders, and saves those in peril.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) supports our citizens and first responders to ensure that as a nation we work together to build, sustain, and improve our capability to prepare for, protect against, respond to, recover from, and mitigate all hazards.

The United States Secret Service (USSS) safeguards the nation's financial infrastructure and payment systems to preserve the integrity of the economy, and protects national leaders, visiting heads of state and government, designated sites, and National Special Security Events.

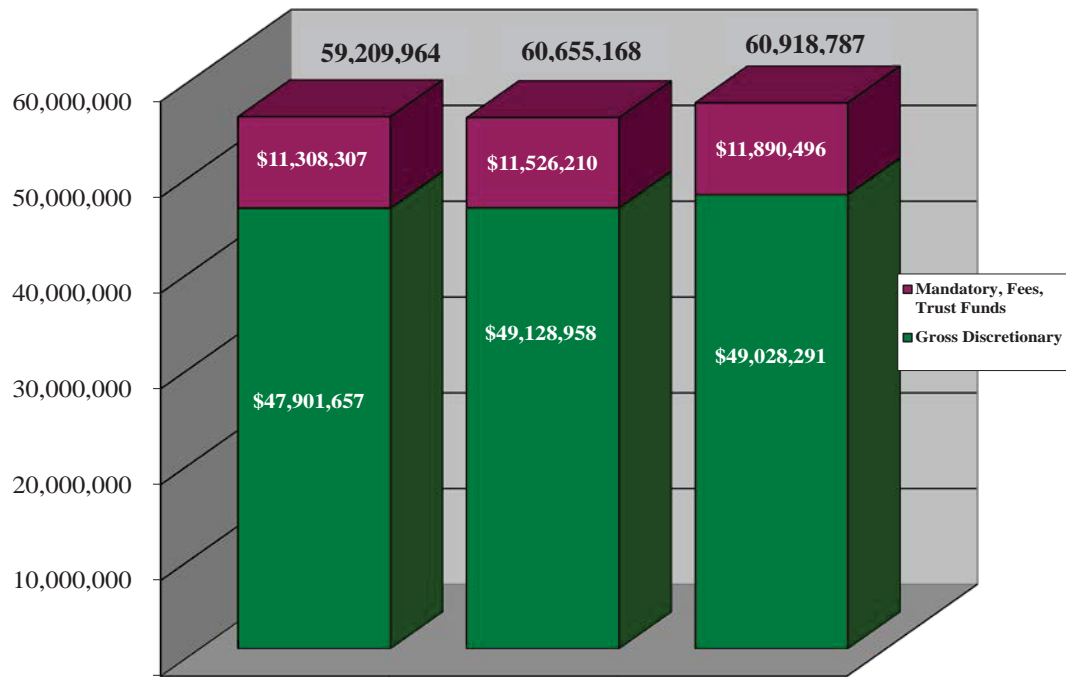

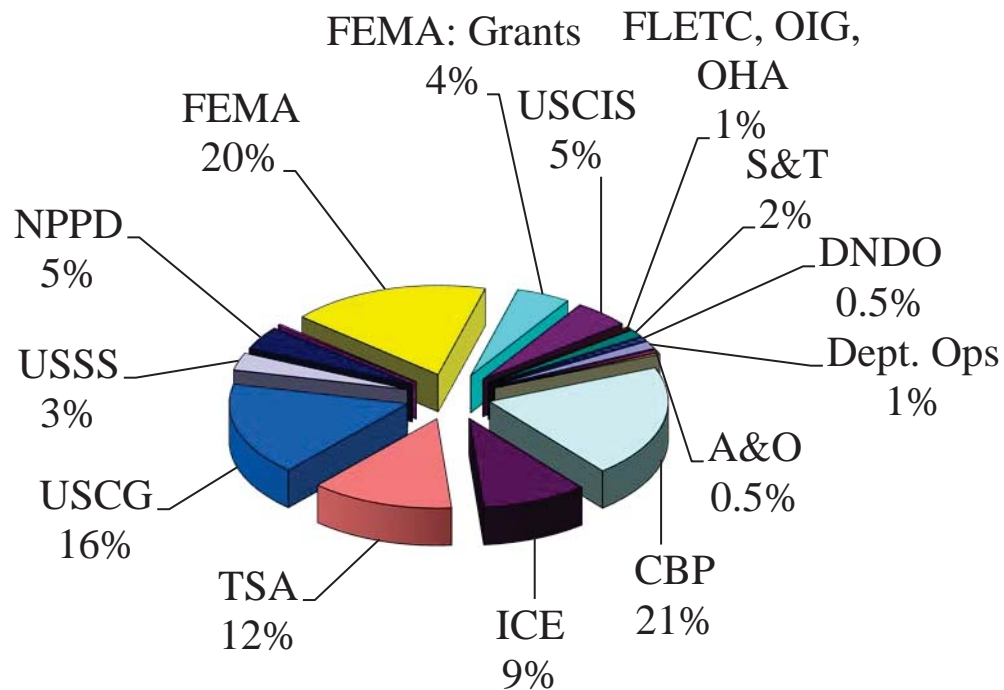

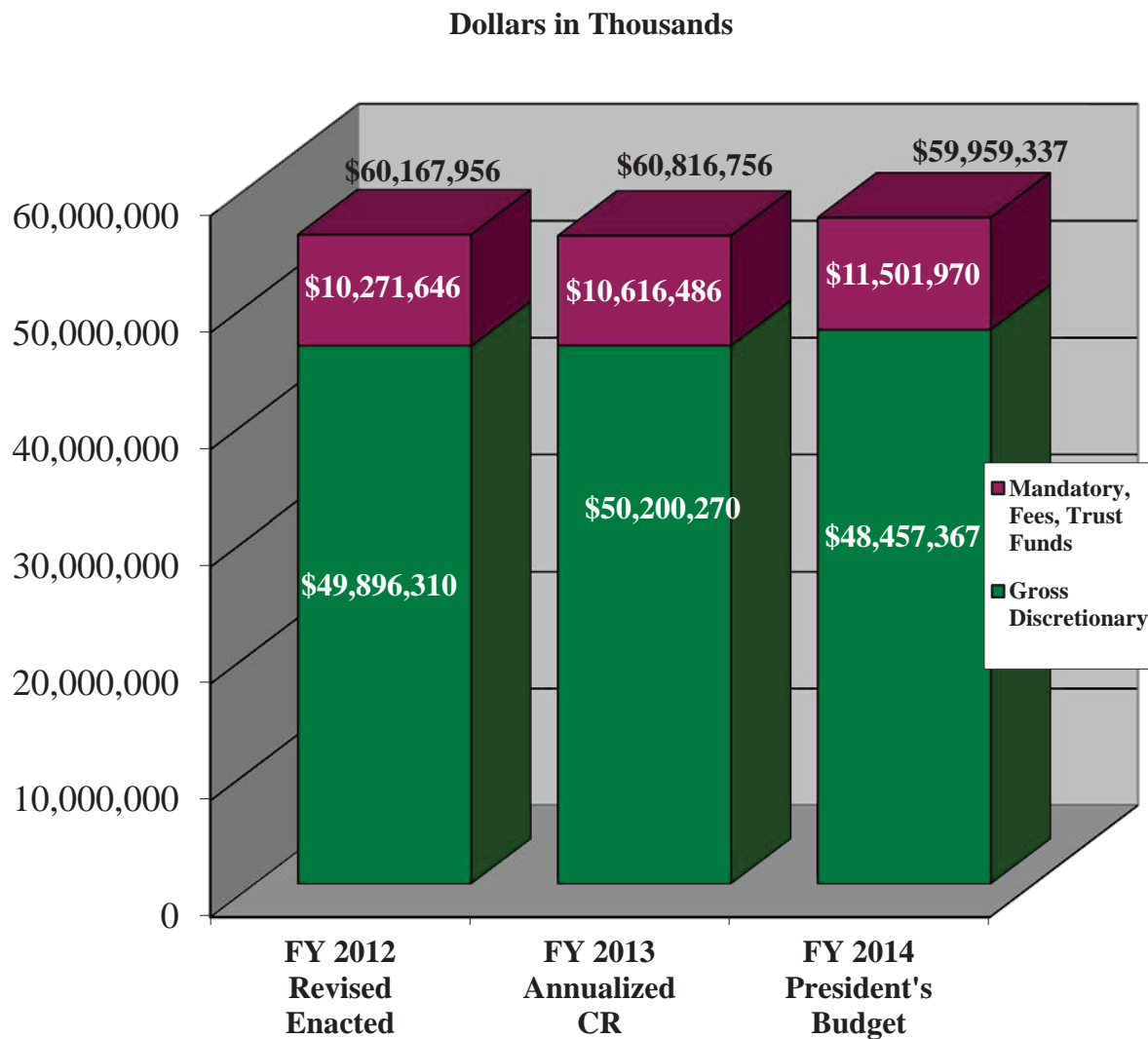

## TOTAL BUDGET AUTHORITY



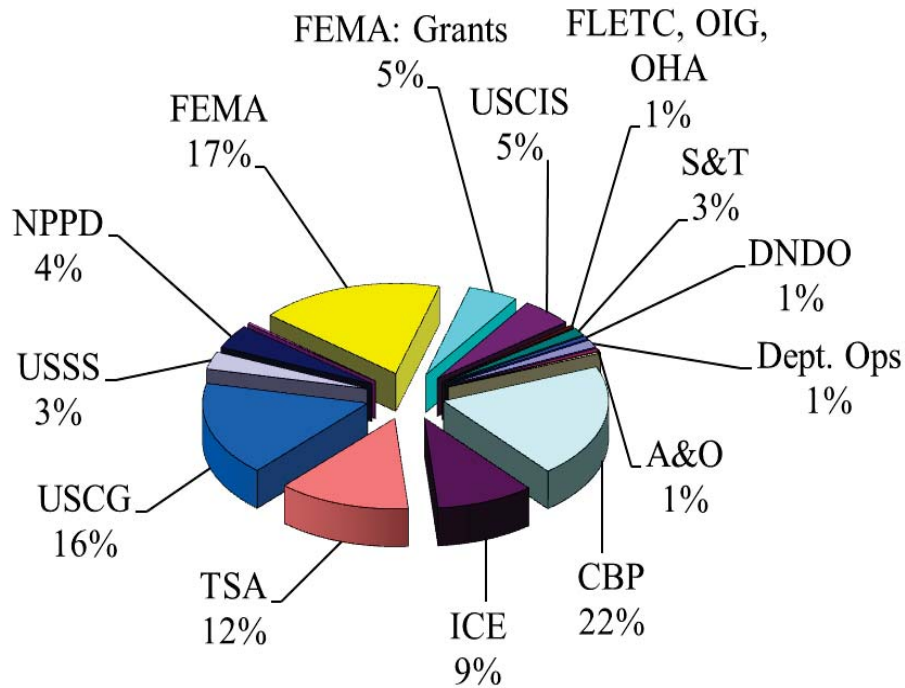

## Message from the Chief Freedom of Information Act Officer

I am pleased to present the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) 2014 Freedom of Information Report to the Attorney General of the United States.

The Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requires that "each agency . . . submit to the Attorney General of the United States a report which shall cover the preceding fiscal year and which shall include" numerous details regarding the agency's administration of FOIA.<sup>1</sup> This annual report plays an important role in the transparency of our office and helps us provide better and more responsive customer service.



DHS receives the largest number of FOIA requests of any federal department or agency in each fiscal year, receiving almost 30 percent of all requests received by the Federal Government. Since President Obama took office, DHS has experienced a 182 percent increase in the number of FOIA requests received. In fiscal year 2014, DHS received 291,242 FOIA requests, its highest number of requests to date.

Most of these requests were directed to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). These Components process requests seeking immigration records (e.g., copies of the Alien File, entry/exit records, detention, and deportation records).

In fiscal year 2014, DHS granted 16,651 requests in full; partially granted 128,603; and denied 6,212 requests on the basis of FOIA exemptions. The Department commonly invokes exemptions 6 and 7(C) to prevent unwarranted injury to the privacy interests of individuals, and exemption 7(E) to protect against the disclosure of law enforcement techniques, procedures, and guidelines. Combined use of 6, 7(C), and 7(E) made up approximately 54 percent of all exemptions used. The number of pending FOIA requests for DHS at the end of fiscal year 2014 was 120,393, an 83 percent increase from the 65,676 requests pending at the end of fiscal year 2013.

DHS also has the largest backlog of pending FOIA requests. Due to the record-setting number of FOIA requests, the DHS backlog increased from 51,575 to 103,480 in fiscal year 2014. Components that process requests seeking immigration-related records have the largest backlogs in the Department comprising more than 90 percent of the total DHS backlog.

The increased volume and complexity of requests for immigration records has directly affected the Department's backlog. The Privacy Office continued to implement a multi-pronged approach to reduce the Department's backlog. Specifically, the Privacy Office: 1) Deployed additional staff and contractors from the Privacy Office to Component FOIA offices to assist with processing backlogged FOIA requests; 2) Entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with CBP for a support services contract with an experienced FOIA vendor to process CBP's FOIA backlog; 3) ICE finalized and is managing its own FOIA services support contract to assist with

processing approximately 50,000 backlogged FOIA requests; and 4) Privacy Office approved a 4-month detail of a staff member to TSA to assist with processing its backlog and to implement procedures for managing FOIA requests to prevent a future backlog.

The total cost of processing FOIA requests for DHS, including litigation costs, increased to more than \$51.5 million in fiscal year 2014 compared to about \$45 million in fiscal year 2013. The average cost of processing a FOIA request in the Department was approximately \$217, compared to last year's figure of \$220. The total full time and equivalent personnel working on FOIA decreased from 474 last year to 459.

The FOIA challenges were immense in the current environment; DHS continued to take steps to enhance its FOIA program by focusing its efforts on offering enhanced training opportunities to educate and encourage agency compliance with the FOIA, and deploying advanced technology for processing requests. Additionally, the DHS Privacy Office initiated several actions to improve the Department's FOIA operation and provide oversight of FOIA processing within the components.

The Department is committed to being responsive to the FOIA requesters, while continuing to address systemic programmatic issues.

2. Definition of terms, expressed in common terminology.

- a. **Administrative Appeal** – A request to a federal agency asking that it review at a higher administrative level a FOIA determination made by the agency at the initial request level.
- b. **Average Number** – The number obtained by dividing the sum of a group of numbers by the quantity of numbers in the group. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the average number is 8, determined by dividing 24 by 3.
- c. **Backlog** – The number of requests or administrative appeals that are pending at an agency at the end of the fiscal year that are beyond the statutory time period for a response.
- d. **Component** – For agencies that process requests on a decentralized basis, a “component” is an entity, also sometimes referred to as an Office, Division, Bureau, Center, or Directorate, within the agency that processes FOIA requests. The FOIA now requires that agencies include in the Annual FOIA Report data for both the agency overall and for each principal component of the agency.
- e. **Consultation** – The procedure whereby the agency responding to a FOIA request first forwards a record to another agency for its review because that other agency has an interest in the document. Once the agency in receipt of the consultation finishes its review of the record, it provides its views on the record to the agency that forwarded it. That agency, in turn, will then respond to the FOIA requester.
- f. **Exemption 3 Statute** – A federal statute other than FOIA that exempts information from disclosure and which the agency relies on to withhold information under subsection (b)(3) of the FOIA.<sup>2</sup>

- g. **FOIA Request** – A FOIA request is generally a request to a federal agency for access to records concerning another person (i.e., a “third-party” request), an organization, or a particular topic of interest. Moreover, because requesters covered by the Privacy Act who seek records concerning themselves (i.e., “first-party” requesters) are afforded the benefit of the access provisions of both FOIA and the Privacy Act, the term “FOIA request” also includes any such “first-party” requests when an agency determines that it must search beyond its Privacy Act “systems of records” or when the agency applies a Privacy Act exemption and therefore looks to FOIA to afford the greatest possible access. DHS applies this same interpretation of the term “FOIA request” even to “first-party” requests from persons not covered by the Privacy Act, e.g., non-U.S. citizens, because DHS by policy provides such persons the ability to access their own records in DHS’s Privacy Act “mixed systems of records” as if they are subject to the Privacy Act’s access provisions, and DHS processes the requests under FOIA as well. Thus, all requests that require DHS to utilize FOIA in responding to the requester are included in this Report.

Additionally, a FOIA request includes records referred to the agency for processing and direct response to the requester. It does not, however, include records for which the agency has received a consultation from another agency. (Consultations are reported separately in Section XII of this Report.)

- h. **Full Grant** – An agency decision to disclose all records in full in response to FOIA request.
- i. **Full Denial** – An agency decision not to release any records in response to a FOIA request because the records are exempt in their entirety under one or more of the FOIA exemptions, or because of a procedural reason, such as when no records could be located.
- j. **Median Number** – The middle, not average, number. For example, of 3, 7, and 14, the median number is 7.
- k. **Multi-Track Processing** – A system in which simple requests requiring relatively minimal review are placed in one processing track and more voluminous and complex requests are placed in one or more other tracks. Requests granted expedited processing are placed in yet another track. Requests in each track are processed on a first in/first out basis.
- i. **Expedited Processing** – An agency will process a FOIA request on an expedited basis when a requester satisfies the requirements for expedited processing as set forth in the statute and in agency regulations.

- ii. **Simple Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in its fastest (non-expedited) track based on the volume and/or simplicity of records requested.
    - iii. **Complex Request** – A FOIA request that an agency using multi-track processing places in a slower track based on the high volume and/or complexity of the records requested.
  - l. **Partial Grant/Partial Denial** – An agency decision to disclose portions of the records and to withhold other portions that are exempt under the FOIA, or to otherwise deny a portion of the request for a procedural reason.
  - m. **Pending Request or Pending Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has not taken final action in all respects.
  - n. **Perfected Request** – A request for records that reasonably describes such records and is made in accordance with published rules stating the time, place, fees (if any) and procedures to be followed.
  - o. **Processed Request or Processed Administrative Appeal** – A request or administrative appeal for which an agency has taken final action in all respects.
  - p. **Range in Number of Days** – The lowest and highest number of days to process requests or administrative appeals.
  - q. **Time Limits** – The time period in the statute for an agency to respond to a FOIA request (ordinarily 20 working days from receipt of a perfected FOIA request).
3. Concise descriptions of FOIA exemptions:
- a. **Exemption 1:** classified national defense and foreign relations information.
  - b. **Exemption 2:** internal agency rules and practices (personnel).
  - c. **Exemption 3:** information that is prohibited from disclosure by another federal law.
  - d. **Exemption 4:** trade secrets and other confidential business information.
  - e. **Exemption 5:** inter-agency or intra-agency communications that are protected by legal privileges.
  - f. **Exemption 6:** information involving matters of personal privacy.

## **APPENDIX A: Composition of the Department of Homeland Security**

The Office of the Secretary oversees Department of Homeland Security (DHS) efforts to counter terrorism and enhance security, secure and manage our borders while facilitating trade and travel, enforce and administer our immigration laws, safeguard and secure cyberspace, build resilience to disasters, and provide essential support for national and economic security - in coordination with federal, state, local, international, tribal, and private sector partners.

### **Offices:**

The Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman (CISOMB) assists individuals and employers in resolving problems with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, identifies systemic issues, and makes recommendations to USCIS to improve the delivery of immigration services.

The Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) supports the Department as it secures the Nation while preserving individual liberty, fairness, and equality under the law.

The Office of the Executive Secretary (ESEC) assures the accurate and timely dissemination of information and written communications from throughout the Department and our homeland security partners to and from the Secretary and Deputy Secretary.

The Office of Intergovernmental Affairs (IGA) promotes an integrated national approach to homeland security by ensuring, coordinating, and advancing federal interaction with state, local, tribal, and territorial governments.

The Military Advisor's Office advises on facilitating, coordinating, and executing policy, procedures, preparedness activities, and operations between the Department and the Department of Defense.

The Office of the General Counsel (OGC) integrates approximately 1700 lawyers from throughout the Department comprised of a headquarters office with subsidiary divisions and the legal programs for eight Department Components.

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) conducts independent and objective inspections, audits, and investigations to provide oversight and promote excellence, integrity, and accountability in DHS programs and operations.

The Office of Legislative Affairs (OLA) serves as primary liaison to members of Congress and their staffs.

The Office of Public Affairs (OPA) coordinates the public affairs activities of all of the Department's Components and offices.

The Privacy Office (PRIV) works to preserve and enhance privacy protections for all individuals and to promote transparency of Department operations.

Department Components and Directorates:

U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is responsible for securing the border against all transnational threats and facilitating trade and travel while enforcing hundreds of U.S. regulations at the border, such as immigration and drug laws.

The Domestic Nuclear Detection Office (DNDO) works to enhance the nuclear detection efforts of federal, state, territorial, tribal, and local governments, and the private sector and to ensure a coordinated response to such threats.

The Office of Policy (PLCY) develops Department-wide policies, programs and planning to promote and ensure quality, consistency and integration across all homeland security missions.

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) protects the Nation's transportation systems to ensure freedom of movement for people and commerce.

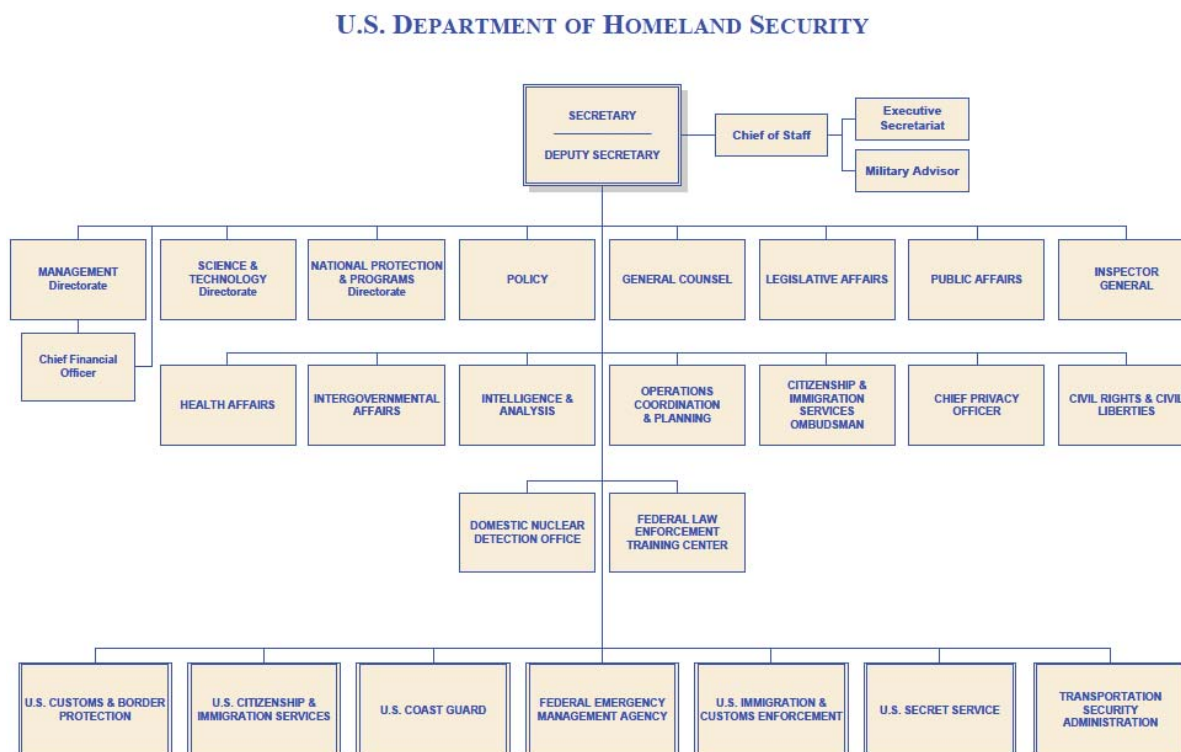

DECLARATION OF MEREDITH R. BROWN

I, Meredith R. Brown, hereby declare and state:

1. I am a practicing attorney licensed to practice before the state of California. My business address is Law Office of Meredith R. Brown, 2013 Broadview Drive, Glendale, CA 91208.
2. I have practiced exclusively in immigration law since 1997, and have been an advocate for the immigrant community since 1988, when I began my work as a volunteer with the Central American Refugee Committee. As an immigration attorney and advocate, I have worked with the immigrant community, community-based leaders, as well as with elected officials.
3. I am a member of the Executive Committee of the Los Angeles County Bar Association's Immigration Section, as well as the American Immigration Lawyers' Association (AILA). I also participate in a variety of immigration-related television and radio news broadcasts in the Los Angeles area.
4. I have approximately 900 open cases in my office, all pertaining to noncitizen clients. I represent noncitizen clients before the United States Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR), or immigration courts. I regularly file FOIA requests on behalf and at the request of clients, who seek information regarding Department of Homeland Security records.
5. Many of these clients seek records from CBP regarding past interaction with border officials, because this past interaction may affect their ability to qualify for lawful permanent resident status. For instance, individuals who are apprehended at the border and are issued "expedited removal orders" pursuant to 8 U.S.C. §1225(b), may be ineligible to qualify for lawful permanent residency. However, not every border apprehension results in "expedited removal," because in some circumstances CBP will allow the applicant to withdraw his application for admission. Such an individual may then still qualify for permanent residency. It is therefore imperative that I obtain CBP records on behalf of and at the request of my clients before they file for lawful permanent residency.



- 1 6. My clients and I also require other information from CBP. This  
2 includes information on entries and exits from the United States, and  
3 the procedure employed at the border determine if the noncitizen has a  
4 "credible fear" of returning to their country of origin. I require this  
5 information in order represent the interests of my clients in defending  
6 against removal from the United States, and in representing them in  
7 applications for lawful permanent residency.
- 8 7. I also require CBP records to determine if clients were paroled in to  
9 the United States, which means that they had an authorized entry.
- 10 8. There have been significant delays in the processing times for my  
11 clients' CBP FOIA requests. These delays negatively impact my  
12 clients' cases, because many forms of relief are time-sensitive, and  
13 waiting for responses to CBP FOIA requests may bar certain forms of  
14 relief. At the same time, the risk involved in moving forward on a  
15 case without knowing the contents of CBP records is also significant,  
16 because a client may not be eligible for relief depending upon the  
17 legal reality of what transpired during a border incident.
- 18 9. I currently have approximately 45 CBP FOIA requests that were filed  
19 on behalf of my clients, which have been pending for more than 20  
20 business days. These include, for example:
  - 21 a. Jorge Carmona Valenzuela, who does not have an alien number  
22 or whose alien number is unknown, and who lives in Panorama  
23 City, California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his behalf on  
24 July 13, 2013. The tracking number for this request is CBP-  
25 2014-017566. I requested records from 1993 and 2003, which  
26 are needed in order to confirm that my client is eligible for  
27 permanent residence through his U.S. citizen wife. He also  
28 needs to visit his elderly father who lives in Mexico and who he  
has not seen in 13 years. No response has been received.
  - b. Guadalupe Casas Guerra, alien number 088-500-050, who lives  
in Reseda, California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on her behalf  
on March 19, 2013. I requested her complete alien file because  
it is necessary to complete her residence application through her  
U.S. citizen husband. No response has been received.



- 1 c. Manuel Cruz Rendon, who does not have an alien number or  
2 whose alien number is unknown, and who lives in Los Angeles,  
3 California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his behalf on March  
4 2, 2013. The tracking number for this request is CBP-2014-  
5 015797. I requested his records from 2001 in order to  
6 determine if he will be eligible for residency if his U.S. Citizen  
7 wife were to submit a relative petition on his behalf. No  
8 response has been received.
- 9 d. Irma Lozano Hernandez, who does not have an alien number or  
10 whose alien number is unknown, and who lives in Los Angeles,  
11 California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on her behalf on  
12 October 7, 2013. The tracking number for this request is CBP-  
13 2014-016398. I requested her records from 2005 to the present  
14 to complete a relative petition that was filed by her U.S. citizen  
15 mother 15 years ago. Irma needs employment authorization in  
16 order to help her 62 year-old mother with her business. No  
17 response has been received.
- 18 e. Oscar Manuel Perez Crisostomo, who does not have an alien  
19 number or whose alien number is unknown, and who lives in  
20 Santa Ana, California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his  
21 behalf on September 28, 2013. I requested his records from  
22 1997 to the present to ascertain if he will be eligible for  
23 permanent residence if his U.S. Citizen wife submitted a  
24 relative petition on his behalf. No response has been received.
- 25 f. Maurilio Rayos, who does not have an alien number or whose  
26 alien number is unknown, and who lives in Compton,  
27 California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his behalf on March  
28 10, 2013. I requested his records from 1998 to the present in  
order to determine whether he had an expedited removal in his  
record. Mr. Rayos would seek a U visa as he was a victim of  
aggravated assault. No response has been received.
- g. Angelica Tagle, who does not have an alien number or whose  
alien number is unknown, and who lives in Maywood,  
California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on her behalf on June  
13, 2013. The tracking number from this request is CBP-  
(legacy tracking number 2013F26516). I requested records  
from 1992 and 1997 in order to determine whether she is  
eligible for permanent residence through her U.S. citizen

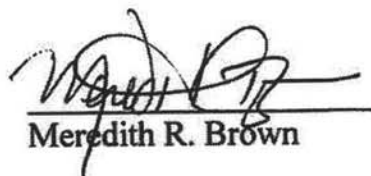
1 husband. Mrs. Tagle would need an I-601A waiver and any  
 2 adverse situations need to be addressed in her application. No  
 3 response has been received.

4 h. Orlanda Urbina, who does not have an alien number or whose  
 5 alien number is unknown, and who lives in North Hollywood,  
 6 California. I filed a CBP FOIA request on her behalf on  
 7 October 21, 2013. I requested her records from 1984 to the  
 8 present because she could be eligible for permanent residence  
 through her U.S. citizen daughter. No response has been  
 received.

9 10. After the filing of the lawsuit in Brown et. al. V. CBP on March  
 10 12, 2015, I received a slew of responses to pending CBP FOIA  
 11 requests that I filed on behalf of clients. Between March 23<sup>rd</sup>  
 12 and March 31<sup>st</sup>, I received approximately 20 responses to  
 13 requests that had been pending for at least six months. I believe  
 14 that these were issued in response to the lawsuit, because prior  
 to the filing of the suit the responses from CBP were taking an  
 extended period, many times in excess of one year.

15 11. I will continue to file CBP FOIA requests in the future in order  
 16 to best represent my clients. I remain hopeful that the CBP will  
 17 be responding at a much faster pace as a result of the lawsuit.

18 I declare under penalty of perjury that the above information is true and

DECLARATION OF JORGE RODRIGUEZ-CHOI

I, Jorge Rodriguez-Choi, hereby declare and state:

1. I am an attorney licensed to practice before the state of California. I have offices in both San Francisco and Oakland, California. My business addresses are 1440 Broadway, Suite 811, Oakland, CA 94612 and 555 California Street, Suite 4925, San Francisco, CA 94104.
2. I graduated from the University of California at Berkeley, and I have practiced immigration and naturalization law exclusively since 1997. I am currently an active member with the American Immigration Lawyers Association.
3. My practice is comprised of comprehensive immigration services including: family-based visas, visas for victims of crime and domestic violence, permanent residence, naturalization, waivers, asylum, deferred action, criminal plea consulting, as well as removal and deportation defense. My work involves representing noncitizen clients before the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR), and the immigration courts.
4. I currently have about 15 open cases in my office involving noncitizen clients.
5. On behalf of and at the request of clients, I regularly file Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests to obtain information regarding Department of Homeland Security records. Many of the FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request of my clients are intended to obtain records from U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).
6. My clients and I are generally seeking all CBP records pertaining to my clients' cases. These records may include information about the clients' entries into and exits from the United States. It is critical that I obtain this information before my clients file for relief, because their eligibility can be adversely affected by information contained in the CBP records. For example, my clients' eligibility for lawful permanent residence depends upon when they entered the United

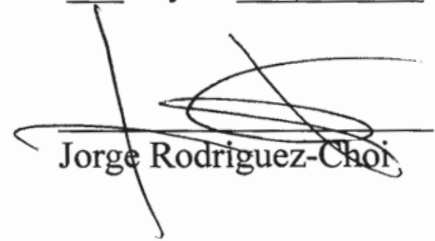
States and whether or when they left or returned to the United States. Therefore, it is essential that I obtain CBP records on behalf of and at the request of my clients before they file for relief.

7. In the CBP FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request of my clients, we also usually request information regarding any border investigations or apprehensions, as well as any expedited removal orders. This information is necessary for me to properly advise and counsel my clients, because their eligibility for relief may be adversely affected by what is contained in CBP records. By way of example, clients who are apprehended at the border may or may not be issued expedited removal orders. It is important that I obtain these records on behalf of and at the request of my clients to find out whether or not they have received expedited removal orders. Clients who have received expedited removal orders may not be eligible for lawful permanent residency, so it is necessary to review the CBP records before filing.
8. I currently have approximately 15 pending CBP FOIA requests which have been pending for more than 20 business days.
9. CBP FOIA delays are a severe problem for me as an attorney seeking to advocate for the best interests of my clients. Many forms of relief have strict filing deadlines, and thus, waiting months for CBP FOIA results can be disastrous or impossible. However, filing before receiving CBP records can also be risky, because clients may not recall border incidents accurately, or may not have understood what legally occurred.
10. After the filing of the lawsuit in Brown et. al. v. CBP on March 12, 2015, I received a slew of responses to pending CBP FOIA requests that I filed on behalf of clients. Between March 23<sup>rd</sup> and March 27<sup>th</sup>, I received 4 responses. I believe that these were issued in response to the lawsuit, because prior to the filing of the suit the responses from CBP were taking an extended period, many times in excess of one year. For instance on March 24, 2015 I received a final response to the CPB FOIAs for Isidro Rodriguez Sanchez filed on June 17, 2013; Nelida Ornelas Renteria filed on June 4, 2014; Santos Miguel Flores Aguilar filed on April 10, 2013 and refiled on June 4, 2014; Maria de Jesus Calderon filed June 26, 2013.



11. CBP has not issued responses to FOIA requests in most of the requests that I filed on behalf of clients. For instance, I have 15 pending requests.
12. I will continue to file CBP FOIA requests in the future in order to best represent my clients.

My work involves representing noncitizen clients before the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR), and the immigration courts. More importantly, I represent clients in front of the Department of State.
4. I currently have about 75 open cases in my office involving noncitizen clients.
5. On behalf of and at the request of clients, I regularly file Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests to obtain information regarding Department of Homeland Security records. Many of the FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request of my clients are intended to obtain records from U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).
6. My clients and I are generally seeking all CBP records pertaining to my clients' cases. These records may include information about the clients' entries into and exits from the United States. It is critical that I obtain this information before my clients file for relief, because their eligibility can be adversely affected by information contained in the CBP records. For example, if a client has entered the United States with inspection, that client may need CBP records to prove this in order to qualify for an adjustment of status.
7. In the CBP FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request

1 of my clients, we also usually request information regarding any  
2 border investigations or apprehensions, as well as any expedited  
3 removal orders. For example, if a client has an expedited removal,  
4 then returns or attempts to return to the United States without  
5 inspection, that client cannot qualify for an I-601 waiver relief under  
6 INA 212 (a)(9)(C) until outside the United States for 10 years. I  
would need to know if there was in fact a removal in order to  
accurately inform my client if they have relief or not.

- 7 8. I currently have approximately seven pending CBP FOIA requests  
8 which have been pending for more than 20 business days.
- 9 9. CBP FOIA delays are a severe problem for me as an attorney  
10 seeking to advocate for the best interests of my clients. Many forms  
11 of relief have strict filing deadlines, and thus, waiting months for  
12 CBP FOIA results can be disastrous or impossible. However, filing  
13 before receiving CBP records can also be risky, because clients may  
14 not recall border incidents accurately, or may not have understood  
15 what legally occurred.
- 16 10. After the filing of the lawsuit in Brown et. al. v. CBP on March 12,  
17 2015, I received responses to pending CBP FOIA requests that I  
18 filed on behalf of clients. Between March 23<sup>rd</sup> and March 27<sup>th</sup>, I  
19 received three (3) responses. I believe that these were issued in  
20 response to the lawsuit, because prior to the filing of the suit the  
21 responses from CBP were taking an extended period, many times in  
22 excess of one year.
- 23 11. CBP has not issued responses to FOIA requests in cases that are  
24 over a year old that I filed on behalf of clients. For instance, CBP-  
25 2013-018294 filed in April of 2013 and CBP-2014-00294 in  
26 November 2013.
- 27 12. I will continue to file CBP FOIA requests in the future in order to  
28 best represent my clients.

DECLARATION OF JERI ANN H. FLYNN

I, Jeri Ann H. Flynn, hereby declare and state:

1. I am an attorney licensed to practice before the State of Louisiana. My business address is Jeri Flynn & Associates, APLC, 5420 Corporate Blvd., Suite 303 Baton Rouge, LA 70808.
2. I graduated from Louisiana State University Law Center and served one year as a law clerk for the Chief Judge of the 19<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Court in East Baton Rouge Parish. I have practiced law in Baton Rouge since 1978, and for many years I have limited my practice to immigration and nationality law.
3. I served as the Louisiana Chapter Chair of the American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA) from 1986 to 1988 and Chapter Chair for the Mid-South Chapter from 1996 to 1997. I also served on AILA's Board of Governors and on numerous AILA committees at the chapter as well as national levels. Since 1987, I have lectured at national conferences for immigration lawyers and written articles for national publications directed toward immigration lawyers. I have been recognized as an expert in immigration law by the Middle District Federal Court in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.
4. My practice consists of family-based immigration, employment-based immigration, non-immigrant applications and visas, asylum, relief from removal and deportation, citizenship, naturalization, immigration consequences of crimes, special immigrant juvenile status, and immigration relief for victims of crimes and domestic violence. My work involves representing noncitizen clients before the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR), and the immigration courts.

Currently, I have approximately 150 open cases in my office involving noncitizen clients.

I regularly file FOIA requests on behalf of and at the request of clients, who seek information regarding Department of Homeland Security records. Many of the FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request of my clients involve records from U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).

Through the CBP FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request of my clients, we are oftentimes seeking records regarding clients' entries into and exits from the United States. My clients' eligibility for different forms of relief depends upon when they entered and whether or when they left or returned to the United States. Thus, it is essential that I obtain CBP records on behalf of and at the request of my clients before they file for relief.

My clients and I also need information from CBP records about past encounters with or apprehensions by border officials. These border interactions affect whether my clients qualify for lawful permanent resident status. For example, many individuals who are apprehended at the border are issued expedited removal orders, and may therefore not be eligible for lawful permanent residency. However, a border apprehension may or may not result in expedited removal, and therefore it is imperative that I obtain these records on behalf of and at the request of my clients before they file for lawful permanent residency so as to appropriately advise them.

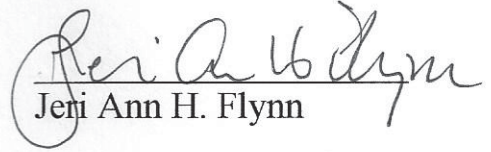
5. I currently have four CBP FOIA requests that were filed on behalf of my clients, one of which has been pending for 26 months. These include:
6. Sulaiman Salah, alien number 077-931-204, who lived in Zachary, Louisiana. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his behalf on May 22, 2013. The tracking number for this request is unknown, but CBP received the request May 22, 2013.
7. Jorge Retana, who does not have an alien number or whose alien number is unknown, and who lives in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his behalf on February 7, 2013. The tracking number for this request is unknown, but CBP received the request and responded on March 25, 2013, by saying I should check with CIS. I sent a second FOIA letter to CPB, which they received April 12, 2013. The tracking numbers in both cases are unknown.
8. Norma Alvarez, who does not have an alien number or whose alien number is unknown, and who lives in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. I filed a CBP FOIA request on her behalf on February 5, 2013. The



tracking number for this request is unknown, but CBP received the request on February 13, 2013

9. David Strachen, alien number 079-427-416, who lives in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. I filed a CBP FOIA request on his behalf on July 11, 2013. The tracking number for this request is 2013F30534. The CBP received this request on July 15, 2013.
10. The processing delays that my clients and I have experienced when seeking CBP records have posed significant hardships. Many forms of relief have strict filing deadlines, and waiting multiple months for CBP FOIA results can be detrimental to a case or has been detrimental to a case. Filing without CBP records can also pose significant risks and have caused harm to all or most of these clients, especially if records of entries or encounters with border officials differ from clients' memories or understanding.

I, Kelly Ryan, hereby declare and state:

It is critical that I obtain this information before my clients file for relief, because their eligibility can be adversely affected by information contained in the CBP records. 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2 7. In the CBP FOIA requests that I file on behalf of and at the request

21 CBP FOIA results can be disastrous or impossible. However, filing  
22 before receiving CBP records can also be risky, because clients may

24 what legally occurred.
- 25 10. After the filing of the lawsuit in Brown et. al. v. CBP on March 12,  
26 2015, I received a slew of responses to pending CBP FOIA requests

I, Matt Adams, hereby declare:

1) I am an attorney at law, admitted in the State of Washington and currently employed by Northwest Immigrant Rights Project (NWIRP) in Seattle, Washington. I am counsel of record for Plaintiffs in this case.

2) I am employed as the Legal Director for Northwest Immigrant Rights Project's (NWIRP), at 615 Second Ave., Ste. 400, Seattle, Washington, 98104. I have been working as an immigration attorney at NWIRP for the last sixteen years. From June 1998 to July of 2005, I worked at NWIRP's Eastern Washington office, in Granger, Washington, first as a Staff Attorney and later as the Directing Attorney of that office. In July of 2006, I assumed my current position as Legal Director of NWIRP, working from the Seattle office. In this role, I am responsible for supervising all attorneys and legal staff and directing all litigation by NWIRP on behalf of clients before the federal district courts and the Court of Appeals.

3) I have extensive experience on cases focusing on immigrant rights. During the last sixteen years, I have litigated cases and personally argued on behalf of immigrants before Immigration Judges; the Board of Immigration Appeals; Federal District Courts, including the Eastern and Western Districts of Washington; the Northern, Central, and Southern Districts of California; and the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. 4) I also have experience as a class action litigator. I have litigated five class actions on behalf of immigrants: *Khoury v. Asher*, 3 F.Supp.3d 877 (W.D. Wash. 2014) (class certification and declaratory relief granted on behalf of class, detained immigrants unlawfully subjected to mandatory

detention); *B-H- v. USCIS*, 2013 WL 5913323, C11-2108RAJ (W.D. Wash. 2013) (approving nation-wide class settlement, challenge to asylum work authorization denials); *Roshandel v. Chertoff*, 554 F.Supp.2d 1194 (W.D.Wash. 2008) (successful class action on behalf of 450 naturalization applicants); *Duran Gonzales v. I have also received the 2013 Access to Justice Advocacy Award and the 2008 Access to Justice Leadership Award, from the Washington State Bar, and the 2005 Washington State Chapter AILA Award for Most Significant Impact in Pro Bono Litigation.

6) Neither myself, NWIRP, or our co-counsel are receiving reimbursement from the individual plaintiffs or class members in this case. All counsel in this case are qualified and capable of adequately and fairly representing the interests of the class.

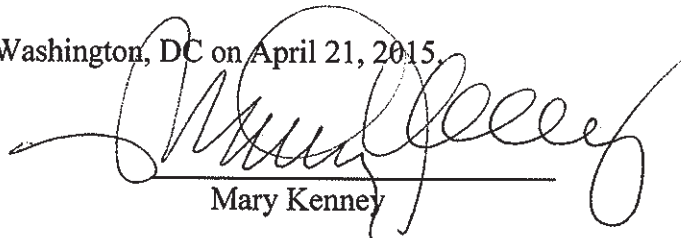

**DECLARATION OF MELISSA CROW  
IN SUPPORT OF PLAINTIFFS' MOTION FOR CLASS CERTIFICATION**

I, Melissa Crow, declare as follows:

1. I am the Legal Director of the American Immigration Council ("Immigration Council") in Washington, DC. The Immigration Council, the ACLU Immigrants' Rights Project, the Northwest Immigrant Rights Project, and Public Counsel are co-counsel for Plaintiffs in the above-captioned litigation. This declaration outlines my qualifications in support of Plaintiffs' Motion for Class Certification.

2. I received my J.D. degree from New York University School of Law in 1994 and am admitted to practice law in New York, the District of Columbia, the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, the U.S. Courts of Appeals for the First, Fifth, Ninth and Eleventh Circuits, and the U.S. Supreme Court.
3. I have practiced immigration law since 2000. During that time, I have personally litigated cases and/or supervised law students in litigating cases on behalf of noncitizens before immigration judges, the Board of Immigration Appeals, and federal district courts. ## INTRODUCTION

1. Plaintiffs are five immigration attorneys and thirteen noncitizens who filed Freedom of Information Act (“FOIA”) requests with Defendant United States Customs And Border Protection (“CBP”), an agency within the Department of Homeland Security (“DHS”). Each of the Plaintiffs have waited for more than twenty days for his or her FOIA request(s) to be processed by Defendants, and most have waited for over a year. Plaintiffs seek information that is critical to determining their eligibility or—in the case of the attorney Plaintiffs—their clients’ eligibility for lawful permanent residence or other immigration relief. Plaintiffs’ efforts to determine eligibility or file immigration applications are stymied for as long as their FOIA requests continue to linger—unprocessed—at CBP.

2. FOIA mandates that an agency issue a response within 20 business days of receiving a FOIA request, *see* 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(A)(I).

3. CBP routinely fails to respond to FOIA requests within the statutory period.

4. Plaintiffs seek to represent a national class of individuals who have filed FOIA requests with CBP, but have not received a response from CBP within 20 business days. CBP’s FOIA backlog has grown exponentially. At the close of fiscal year (“FY”) 2014, CBP had 34,307 FOIA requests that had been pending for more than 20 business days.<sup>1</sup> The FY 2014 backlog was almost eight times greater than it had been just three

1 years earlier, at the close of FY 2011.<sup>2</sup>

2 5. CBP contributed to this ever-growing backlog by processing fewer cases each  
3 year between FY 2011 and 2013.<sup>3</sup> In FY 2014, CBP processed 51,056 requests,  
4 substantially more than the 26,571 requests processed in FY 2013 and the 27,818 requests  
5 processed in FY 2012.<sup>4</sup> Yet CBP's 2014 processing did not substantially reduce its FOIA  
6 backlog, which was 37,848 in FY 2013 and 34,307 in FY 2014, a reduction of only 3,795  
7 requests, less than ten percent.<sup>5</sup>

9 6. CBP has significantly more funding than its two counterparts within DHS—  
10 United States Citizenship and Immigration Services ("USCIS") and United States  
11 Immigration and Customs Enforcement ("ICE").<sup>6</sup> Despite this, its FOIA backlog is

1 significantly greater than USCIS.<sup>7</sup>

2           7.       Plaintiffs and the Proposed Class suffer harm due to Defendants' failure to  
3 respond to their requests because—without the information that they have requested  
4 through FOIA—they are unable to ascertain the legal significance of their or their clients'  
5 past interactions with border officials. Defendants' delay also prevents Plaintiffs and the  
6 Proposed Class from moving forward with applications for which they or their clients may  
7 be eligible, and causes unnecessary emotional hardship for those left in legal limbo while  
8 they wait to obtain the records that hold the key to assessing their immigration options in  
9 the United States.

10  
11           8.       Due to this backlog and the ensuing harm it causes, Plaintiffs seek class  
12 certification, declaratory relief, and injunctive relief ordering CBP to respond to FOIA  
13 requests which have been pending for more than 20 business days, and ordering CBP to  
14 timely process future requests as required by FOIA. 5 U.S.C. §§ 552(a)(6); 552(a)(3).

15  
16                           **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

17           9.       This Court has jurisdiction under 5 U.S.C. § 552 *et seq.* (FOIA statute), 28  
18 U.S.C. § 1331 (federal question), and 28 U.S.C. § 2201 (declaratory judgment).

19           10.      Venue is proper under 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(4)(B) and 28 U.S.C. § 1391(e)(1)  
20 because this is a civil action in which Defendant is a national agency; because Plaintiffs  
21 Jorge Rodriguez-Choi, Arturo Dominguez Cobos, Isidro de Jesus Rodriguez Sanchez,  
22 and Nelida Ornelas Renteria, reside in this judicial district; and there is no real property  
23 involved in this action.

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25           11.      Plaintiffs have exhausted any and all administrative remedies in

9           30. Defendant CBP is a component agency of DHS and is an agency within  
10 the meaning of 5 U.S.C. § 552(f)(1). Among other duties, CBP is responsible for  
11 enforcing immigration laws at the borders and other ports of entry to the United States.  
12 CBP inspects all individuals seeking entry to the United States, including U.S. citizens,  
13 lawful permanent residents, nonimmigrants, and asylum seekers. CBP has authority to  
14 admit or exclude individuals, issue “expedited removal” orders, parole noncitizens into  
15 the United States, and permit them to withdraw applications for admission. CBP has in  
16 its possession, custody, and control the records Plaintiffs seek.

17           31. Defendant DHS is an executive agency of the United States with  
18 responsibility for enforcing the immigration laws of the United States. In addition to  
19 CBP, DHS houses at least two additional immigration-related component agencies: ICE

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**FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS**

**CBP's Processing Times and Backlog**

32. The statutory time period for a FOIA response is 20 business days. 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(A)(i).

33. At the close of FY 2014, there were 34,307 requests pending at CBP. CBP's average FOIA processing times and its backlog grew substantially from FY 2011-2013, and has remained roughly the same in FY 2014.

34. DHS defines "backlog" as the "number of requests or administrative appeals pending at an agency at the end of the fiscal year that are beyond the statutory time period for a response."<sup>8</sup>

35. DHS reported that CBP received 32,107 FOIA requests in FY 2011, 33,243 FOIA requests in FY 2012, 41,381 FOIA requests in FY 2013, and 47,261 FOIA requests in FY 2014.<sup>9</sup>

36. DHS reported that CBP had a backlog of 4,365 requests at the close of FY 2011.<sup>10</sup> In FY 2012, this number increased to 10,648 pending requests.<sup>11</sup> By the end of FY 2013, the backlog grew exponentially to 37,848 pending FOIA requests.<sup>12</sup> In FY

2014, the backlog remained roughly the same at 34,307 decreasing less than ten percent.<sup>13</sup>  
*Over the course of these four fiscal years, the backlog grew by a total of 29,942 requests; consequently, in FY 2014, the backlog was almost eight times larger than it was in 2011.*

37. The increase in the number of FOIA requests filed in FY 2011 through FY 2013 is much less than the increase in backlogged requests during this same period. Indeed, DHS reported a dramatic *decrease* in the number of requests that CBP processed each year: from 27,818 requests processed in FY 2011 down to only 14,635 requests processed in FY 2013.<sup>14</sup> In FY 2014, CBP processed 51,056 requests, after having received 47,261 that year, but only marginally reduced its backlog.<sup>15</sup>

38. Any effort that CBP has made to clear this backlog has been wholly inadequate and ineffectual. Even were CBP able to continue to reduce its backlog at the pace set in FY 2014—which is questionable given its documented history of failing to address its backlog in prior years—CBP would not dispose of its current backlog for 9.6 years.<sup>16</sup>

39. CBP's backlog is almost seven times larger than the backlog for USCIS (the agency responsible for adjudicating immigration applications and for processing FOIA requests seeking copies of an individual's "alien registration file"—commonly referred to as the "A file"), even though DHS reported a backlog of just 5,026 cases for

1 USCIS at the close of FY 2014, compared to the 34,307 cases for CBP.<sup>17</sup>

2 40. No exceptional circumstances exist warranting a delay in processing CBP  
3 FOIA requests. An agency's failure to keep up with the pace of FOIA requests is not an  
4 "exceptional circumstance."  
5

6 41. CBP has failed to timely respond to Plaintiffs' FOIA requests in the 20  
7 business days required by statute, and has a pattern or practice of failing to do so with  
8 respect to the majority of FOIA requests it receives. CBP has not demonstrated due  
9 diligence in responding to Plaintiffs' FOIA requests or in clearing out the backlog of  
10 overdue FOIA requests.

11 42. Moreover, CBP has more funding than any of the fourteen agencies within  
12 DHS, including USCIS, ICE, FEMA, the U.S. Coast Guard, and the U.S. Secret  
13 Service.<sup>18</sup> Further, in the last two fiscal years, CBP received the second largest increase  
14 in funding of the 14 other agencies within DHS.<sup>19</sup>  
15  
16

17 **Harm to Plaintiffs and Proposed Class Members**

18 43. CBP records often are critical evidence in immigration cases. A  
19 noncitizen's past interactions with CBP may affect his or her ability to qualify for lawful  
20 permanent resident status. For example, to adjust to lawful permanent resident status, a  
21 noncitizen must document that he or she was "inspected and admitted or paroled" into the  
22 United States. 8 U.S.C. § 1255(a). At all U.S. ports of entry, CBP is the agency

1 responsible for determining who is to be admitted or paroled into the United States. CBP  
2 maintains records of many of the admission and parole decisions it makes with respect to  
3 noncitizens. In many adjustment of status cases, these records are the only evidence that  
4 the applicant can produce to demonstrate that he or she was admitted or paroled and  
5 therefore eligible for lawful permanent resident status.  
6

7 44. Additionally, pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1225(b), CBP issues “expedited  
8 removal orders” against some individuals apprehended at the border who attempted entry  
9 without proper documentation. Other individuals are permitted to withdraw their  
10 applications for admission and depart the United States without having an expedited  
11 removal order entered against them. 8 U.S.C. § 1225(a)(4). Many individuals who are  
12 turned away at the border are uncertain if they were issued expedited removal orders or  
13 simply permitted to withdraw their applications for admission.  
14

15 45. Those individuals who are issued expedited removal orders are, at a  
16 minimum, inadmissible to the United States for a five-year period and, consequently,  
17 ineligible for an immigrant or nonimmigrant visa and ineligible to adjust status during this  
18 period. In addition, if CBP documentation shows that the expedited removal order was  
19 issued based on an allegedly false claim to U.S. citizenship, the person may be found to be  
20 permanently inadmissible. See 8 U.S.C. § 1182(a)(6)(C)(ii). Moreover, even if the five-  
21 year period has elapsed, the existence of the prior expedited removal order may affect  
22 future visa and adjustment applications that have a discretionary component.  
23

24 46. Individuals who have returned to the United States after prior interactions  
25 with CBP, and their attorneys, are harmed by CBP’s failure to timely process their FOIA  
26 requests. To understand their situations, assess their options, and make life decisions,  
27 these individuals, as well as lawyers advising them, need to know if CBP previously  
28

1 admitted or paroled them into the United States or issued an expedited removal order. If  
2 the FOIA production reveals that CBP issued an expedited removal order, these  
3 individuals potentially face additional grounds of inadmissibility, some of which may  
4 require an additional waiver application. Other individuals who have returned to the  
5 United States may potentially face criminal prosecution, see 8 U.S.C. §§ 1325 and 1326,  
6 and a summary removal process known as reinstatement of removal, see 8 U.S.C. §  
7 1231(a)(5).  
8

9 **Plaintiffs' FOIA Requests**

10 47. Plaintiff Brown is an immigration attorney in Glendale, California who  
11 represents clients before component agencies of DHS and the Executive Office for  
12 Immigration Review (EOIR), which consists of the immigration courts and the Board of  
13 Immigration Appeals. She has been practicing immigration law for approximately 17  
14 years.  
15

16 48. Plaintiff Brown regularly files FOIA requests on behalf of and at the  
17 request of her clients, who seek information maintained by DHS agencies, including CBP.  
18 Plaintiff Brown requires the information requested from CBP in order to adequately  
19 advise and represent her clients, including in defending against removal from the United  
20 States and applying for affirmative immigration benefits, such as applications for lawful  
21 permanent resident status. The requested information may affect her clients' eligibility for  
22 different forms of immigration benefits; it is therefore essential that she obtain the  
23 information from CBP before filing for any immigration benefits.  
24

25 49. Plaintiff Brown currently has approximately 45 CBP FOIA requests that  
26 have been pending for more than 20 business days. After Plaintiffs filed the original  
27 complaint in this case on March 12, 2015, Plaintiff Brown received a slew of responses to  
28

1 pending CBP FOIA requests. Between March 23 and March 31, 2015, she received  
2 approximately 20 responses to FOIA requests that were filed on behalf of her clients.  
3 Upon information and belief, these responses were issued in response to this lawsuit.  
4 Plaintiff Brown continues to file CBP FOIA requests on behalf of her clients,  
5

6 50. Plaintiff Rodriguez-Choi is an immigration attorney with offices in San  
7 Francisco and Oakland, California who represents clients before component agencies of  
8 DHS and EOIR. He has been practicing immigration law for approximately 17 years.

9 51. Plaintiff Rodriguez-Choi regularly files FOIA request on behalf of and at  
10 the request of his clients, who seek information maintained by DHS agencies, including  
11 CBP. Plaintiff Rodriguez-Choi requires the information requested from CBP in order to  
12 adequately advise and represent his clients, including defending against removal from the  
13 United States and applying for affirmative immigration benefits, such as applications for  
14 lawful permanent resident status. The requested information may affect his clients'  
15 eligibility for different forms of immigration benefits; it is therefore essential that he  
16 obtain the information from CBP before filing for any immigration benefits.  
17

18 52. Plaintiff Rodriguez-Choi currently has approximately 15 CBP FOIA  
19 requests that have been pending for more than 20 business days.  
20

21 53. Plaintiff Cannon is an immigration attorney in Cambridge, Massachusetts  
22 who represents clients before component agencies of DHS and EOIR. She has been  
23 practicing immigration law for approximately 6 years.

24 54. Plaintiff Cannon regularly files FOIA request on behalf of and at the  
25 request of her clients, who seek information maintained by DHS agencies, including CBP.  
26 Plaintiff Cannon requires the information requested from CBP in order to adequately  
27 advise and represent her clients, including defending against removal from the United  
28

1 States and applying for affirmative immigration benefits, such as applications for lawful  
2 permanent resident status. The requested information may affect her clients' eligibility for  
3 different forms of immigration benefits; it is therefore essential that she obtain the  
4 information from CBP before filing for any immigration benefits.

5  
6 55. Plaintiff Cannon currently has approximately seven CBP FOIA requests  
7 that have been pending for more than 20 business days, including at least two requests that  
8 have been pending for a year or more.

9 56. Plaintiff Ryan is an immigration attorney in Denver, Colorado who  
10 represents clients before component agencies of DHS and EOIR. She has been practicing  
11 immigration law for approximately seven years.

12 57. Plaintiff Ryan regularly files FOIA requests on behalf of and at the request  
13 of her clients, who seek information maintained by DHS agencies, including CBP.  
14 Plaintiff Ryan requires the information requested from CBP in order to adequately advise  
15 and represent her clients, including in defending against removal from the United States  
16 and applying for affirmative immigration benefits, such as applications for lawful  
17 permanent resident status. The requested information may affect her clients' eligibility for  
18 different forms of immigration benefits; it is therefore essential that she obtain the  
19 information from CBP before filing for any immigration benefits.  
20

21  
22 58. At the time of the initial filing of this case, Plaintiff Ryan had  
23 approximately 13 CBP FOIA requests that had been pending for more than 20 business  
24 days. After the March 12, 2015 filing of this case, Plaintiff Ryan received a slew of  
25 responses to pending CBP FOIA requests, including responses to at least nine requests  
26 that had been pending for more than one year. Between March 23 and March 25, 2015,  
27 she received 11 responses to FOIA requests that were filed on behalf of her clients. Upon  
28

1 information and belief, these responses were issued in response to this lawsuit. Plaintiff  
2 Ryan will continue to file CBP FOIA requests on behalf of her clients,

3         59. Plaintiff Flynn is an immigration attorney in Baton Rouge, Louisiana who  
4 represents clients before component agencies of DHS and EOIR. She has been practicing  
5 law for approximately 36 years.

6         60. Plaintiff Flynn regularly files FOIA requests on behalf of and at the request of her  
7 clients, who seek information maintained by DHS agencies, including CBP. Plaintiff Flynn  
8 requires the information requested from CBP in order to adequately advise and represent her  
9 clients, including in defending against removal from the United States and applying for affirmative  
10 immigration benefits, such as applications for lawful permanent resident status. The requested  
11 information may affect her clients' eligibility for different forms of immigration benefits; it is  
12 therefore essential that she obtain the information from CBP before filing for any immigration  
13 benefits.  
14

15         61. Plaintiff Flynn currently has approximately four CBP FOIA requests that  
16 have been pending for more than 20 business days, including one that has been pending  
17 for more than two years.

18         62. Plaintiff Dominguez Cobos, through his attorney, filed a FOIA request  
19 with CBP on August 18, 2014, seeking information about his entry into the United States  
20 to support his application for lawful permanent residence. CBP issued a receipt for his  
21 FOIA request, number CBP-2014-041458. Although Plaintiff Dominguez Cobos' FOIA  
22 request has been pending for 8 months, he has not received the requested information.

23         63. Plaintiff Dominguez Cobos, who has lived in the United States since 2000,  
24 is married to a United States citizen. The requested information is necessary to determine  
25 if he is eligible for lawful permanent residence.  
26  
27  
28

1           64.     Plaintiff Rodriguez Sanchez, through his attorney, filed a FOIA request  
2 with CBP on June 17, 2013, seeking information about a possible past expedited removal  
3 order issued by CBP at the United States border. CBP issued a receipt for his FOIA  
4 request, number CBP-2013-019829. Although Plaintiff Rodriguez Sanchez's FOIA  
5 request has been pending with CBP for 19 months, he has not received the requested  
6 information.  
7

8           65.     Plaintiff Rodriguez Sanchez has been in the United States for 14 years and  
9 has three United States citizen children. His attorney requires a response to his pending  
10 FOIA request to determine if he is eligible for lawful permanent resident status.  
11

12           66.     Plaintiff Ornelas Renteria, through her attorney, filed a FOIA request with  
13 CBP on April 1, 2013, seeking information about a past encounter with CBP, and whether  
14 it disqualifies her from applying for lawful permanent resident status. CBP issued a  
15 receipt for her FOIA request, number CBP-2013-011307. Although Plaintiff Ornelas  
16 Renteria's FOIA request has been pending with CBP for 24 months, she has not received  
17 the requested information.  
18

19           67.     Plaintiff Ornelas Renteria has been in the United States since 2003 and is  
20 married to a United States citizen. Her attorney requires the information sought in the  
21 FOIA request filed with CBP in order to determine her eligibility for lawful permanent  
22 resident status.  
23

24           68.     Plaintiff Cruz Rendon, through his attorney, filed a FOIA request with  
25 CBP on March 2, 2013, seeking information regarding his encounters with CBP agents at  
26 the United States/Mexico border. CBP issued a receipt for his FOIA request, number  
27 CBP-2014-015797. Although Plaintiff Cruz Rendon's FOIA request has been pending  
28 with CBP for 25 months, he has not received the requested information.



1           69. Plaintiff Cruz Rendon wishes to apply to adjust his status to lawful  
2 permanent resident. His wife is prepared to submit a visa petition on his behalf, a  
3 necessary prerequisite to his filing an adjustment of status application with USCIS.  
4 Plaintiff Cruz Rendon seeks the requested information to determine if he will be eligible  
5 to adjust his status.  
6

7           70. Plaintiff Urbina, through her attorney, filed a FOIA request with CBP on  
8 October 21, 2013, seeking information regarding any interactions she may have had with  
9 CBP officers from 1999 to the present. CBP did not issue a FOIA receipt. Although  
10 Plaintiff Urbina's FOIA request has been pending with CBP for 17 months, she has not  
11 received the requested information.  
12

13           71. Plaintiff Urbina has a United States citizen daughter, United States citizen  
14 mother, and lawful permanent resident father. The requested information is necessary for  
15 her attorney to assess her eligibility for immigration benefits.

16           72. Plaintiff Cruz Rojas, through his attorney, filed a FOIA request with CBP  
17 on July 26, 2013, seeking information about any encounters he may have had with CBP  
18 agents. CBP issued a receipt for his FOIA request, number CBP-2013-024525. Although  
19 Plaintiff Cruz Rojas' FOIA has been pending with CBP for 20 months, he has not received  
20 the requested information.  
21

22           73. Plaintiff Cruz Rojas has lived in the United States for 15 years and has  
23 three U.S. citizen children, two U.S. citizen siblings, lawful permanent resident parents  
24 and sibling, and U.S. citizen in-laws. The requested information is necessary for his  
25 attorney to assess his eligibility for immigration benefits.

26           74. Plaintiff Calderon Ruiz, through her attorney, filed a FOIA request with  
27 CBP on June 26, 2013, inquiring as to any records issued by CBP in approximately 1993  
28

1 in San Ysidro, California. CBP issued a receipt for this FOIA request, number CBP-2013-  
2 021129. Although her FOIA request has been pending with CBP for 19 months, she has  
3 not yet received the requested information.

4 75. Plaintiff Calderon Ruiz has resided in the United States since  
5 approximately 1993 and is married to a United States citizen. She has three United States  
6 citizen children. Her attorney seeks a response to the FOIA request to determine whether  
7 Plaintiff Calderon Ruiz's husband may file a visa petition on her behalf and whether she  
8 can apply for lawful permanent residence.

9  
10 76. Plaintiff Lucero Ramirez, through her attorney, filed a FOIA request with  
11 CBP on August 7, 2014, inquiring as to any CBP records evidencing an order of expedited  
12 removal. CBP issued a receipt for the FOIA, number CBP-2014-041050. Although her  
13 FOIA request has been pending for 8 months, she has not yet received the requested  
14 records.

15  
16 77. Plaintiff Lucero Ramirez is married to a United States citizen and has two  
17 United States citizen children. Her attorney requires the requested information in order to  
18 counsel Plaintiff Lucero Ramirez's husband about filing a visa petition on her behalf, and  
19 to counsel her about filing an application for lawful permanent residence.

20  
21 78. Plaintiff Castor-Lara, through her attorney, filed a FOIA request with CBP  
22 on October 28, 2014, requesting records regarding her date of entry into the United States  
23 in order to determine if she is eligible to apply for lawful permanent resident status. CBP  
24 issued a receipt for the FOIA, number CBP-OFO-2015-003774. Although her FOIA  
25 request has been pending for 5 months, she has not received a response.

26 79. Plaintiff Castor-Lara is married to a lawful permanent resident with a  
27 pending application for naturalization. She has resided in the United States for 12 years  
28

1 and has three United States citizen children. She requires information from CBP in order  
2 for her attorney to determine if she may apply for lawful permanent resident status once  
3 her husband becomes a U.S. citizen.

4 80. Plaintiff Gonzalez-Ordonez, through her attorney, filed a FOIA request  
5 with CBP on April 14, 2014, seeking information about any entries into the United States  
6 she may have made. CBP issued a receipt for her FOIA request, number  
7 CBP2014021792. Although Plaintiff Gonzalez-Ordonez 's FOIA request has been  
8 pending with CBP for 12 months, she has not received the requested information.  
9

10 81. Plaintiff Gonzalez-Ordonez is married to a United States citizen. The  
11 requested information is necessary for her attorney to determine if she is eligible for any  
12 immigration benefit.  
13

14 82. Plaintiff Pichardo-Delgado, through his attorney, filed a FOIA request  
15 with CBP on July 18, 2014, seeking information about his interactions with CBP when he  
16 first attempted to enter the United States 10 to 12 years ago. CBP issued a receipt for his  
17 FOIA request, number CBP-2014-037520. Although Plaintiff Pichardo-Delgado's FOIA  
18 request has been pending with CBP for approximately 9 months, he has not received the  
19 requested information.  
20

21 83. Plaintiff Pichardo-Delgado is married to a United States citizen. He and  
22 his wife have two children, who also are United States citizens. They also live with his  
23 two United States stepchildren. The requested information is necessary for his attorney to  
24 determine if he is eligible for lawful permanent residence.

25 84. Plaintiff Asrali, through his attorney, filed a FOIA request with CBP on  
26 May 12, 2014, seeking information about any entries he made into the United States and  
27 copies of any CBP forms documenting these entries. CBP issued a receipt for his FOIA  
28

1 request, number CBP-2014-026336. Although Plaintiff Asrali's FOIA request has been  
2 pending with CBP for 11 months, he has not received the requested information.

3 85. Plaintiff Asrali has been living in the United States for 25 years. His sister  
4 and his brother are applicants for lawful permanent residency. The requested information  
5 is necessary for his attorney to determine if he is eligible to apply for any immigration  
6 benefit.  
7

8 86. On March 12, 2015, Plaintiffs filed the initial complaint in this action.  
9 Santos Miguel Flores Aguilar, Emma Quezada, Maico Montoya-Arellano, and Noe  
10 Zaragoza-Quiroz were previously named as plaintiffs in addition to current Plaintiffs  
11 Meredith R. Brown, Kelly Ryan, Jeri Flynn, Isidro De Jesus Rodriguez Sanchez, Nelida  
12 Ornelas Renteria, Manuel Cruz Rendon, Orlanda Urbina, Juan De Dios Cruz Rojas, Maria  
13 De Jesus Calderon Ruiz, and Cristina Lucero Ramirez. After the filing of the March 12,  
14 2015 complaint, CBP issued responses to the FOIA requests for Plaintiffs Flores Aguilar,  
15 Quezada, Montoya-Arellano, and Zaragoza-Quiroz. FOIA requests for these four  
16 plaintiffs had been pending before CBP for between one year and 23 months when the  
17 lawsuit was filed. On information and belief, this litigation prompted CBP to issue  
18 responses to these plaintiffs.  
19

20 87. This First Amended Complaint includes additional plaintiffs, including  
21 attorneys Rodriguez-Choi and Cannon, as well as noncitizen plaintiffs Dominguez Cobos,  
22 Castor-Lara, Escobedo, Gonzalez-Ordenez, Pichardo-Delgado, and Asrali,  
23  
24  
25  
26  
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**CLASS ACTION ALLEGATIONS**

88. Pursuant to Federal Rules of Civil Procedure 23(a) and (b), Plaintiffs bring this action on behalf of themselves and all other similarly situated individuals. Plaintiffs seek injunctive relief that applies generally to the Proposed Class, as described below.

89. The Proposed Class consists of:

All individuals who have filed FOIA requests with CBP which have been pending for more than 20 business days, and all individuals who will file FOIA requests with CBP that will remain pending for more than 20 business days.

90. The Proposed Class is so numerous that joinder of all members is impracticable. The number of individuals who filed FOIA requests with CBP is not known with precision by Plaintiffs, but is easily ascertainable by Defendant. DHS' 2014 FOIA Annual Report indicates that there were 34,307 pending requests in the CBP backlog. Of that group, it is unknown how many requests are still pending. Hence, Plaintiffs estimate that the number of requests pending for more than 20 business days is in the thousands.

91. Common questions of law and fact bind the members of the Proposed Class. These include, but are not limited to: whether CBP's pattern or practice of failing to timely respond to FOIA requests within the 20-day statutory period violates the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(A)(i).

92. The claims of the named Plaintiffs are typical of the claims of the Proposed Class as a whole.

93. Plaintiffs know of no conflict between their interests and those of the Proposed Class. The members of the Proposed Class are ascertainable and identifiable through notice and discovery. In defending their own rights, the individual Plaintiffs will defend the rights of all class members fairly and adequately.



100. Exceptional circumstances do not justify CBP's delay in processing FOIA requests, and CBP has not exercised due diligence in responding to and clearing the backlog of pending FOIA requests.

101. Defendant has failed to respond to FOIA requests of Plaintiffs and Proposed Class members, to make timely determinations concerning these requests, and to disclose responsive records within the statutory time frame, in violation of 5 U.S.C. §§ 552(a)(3) and (a)(6)(A) and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

102. Defendant's failure to make determinations concerning Plaintiffs' requests for records within the statutory time period constitutes a constructive denial of Plaintiffs' requests, and Plaintiffs are deemed to have exhausted their administrative remedies. 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(C)(i).

### **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs pray that this Court grant the following relief:

- (1) Certify a class pursuant to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 23 in accordance with this Complaint's allegations;
- (2) Declare that CBP's failure to conduct reasonable and timely searches for records responsive to Plaintiffs' and Proposed Class members' FOIA requests and its refusal to disclose such records within the statutory time frame violate the FOIA;
- (3) Issue a nationwide injunction requiring Defendant to respond to CBP FOIA requests that have been pending for more than 20 business days, within 60 business days of the Court's order or as the Court deems appropriate;



- 1 (4) Order CBP to respond to FOIA requests of Proposed Class members as  
2 mandated by 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(A)(i);  
3 (5) Award costs and reasonable attorney fees incurred under 5 U.S.C. §  
4 552(a)(4)(E); and  
5 (6) Grant such further relief as the Court deems just and proper.
