### **NATURE OF THE ACTION**

This an action under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and Title I of the Civil Rights Act of 1991, to correct unlawful employment practices on the basis of race and to provide relief to Lois Hall. The Commission alleges that Defendants violated Title VII by reducing Ms. Hall's hours based on her race, Black, resulting in her constructive discharge.

#### JURISDICTION AND VENUE

1. Jurisdiction of this Court is invoked pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §451, 1331, 1337, 1343, 1345. This action is authorized and instituted pursuant to Section 706(1)(f) and (3) of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, ("Title VII"), 42 U.S.C. §2000e-5(f) (1) and (3), and Section 102 of the Civil Rights Act of 1991, 42 U.S.C. § 1981A.

2. The employment practices alleged to be unlawful were and are now being committed within the jurisdiction of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, Waco Division.

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#### **PARTIES**

3. Plaintiff, Equal Employment Opportunity Commission of (the "Commission"), is an agency of the United States of America charged with the administration, interpretation and enforcement of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and is expressly authorized to bring this action by Sections 706(f)(1) and (3) of Title VII, 42 U.S.C. §2000e-5(f)(1) and (3).

4. At all relevant times, Defendants, B & A Dane LLC et al. d/b/a Pro-Cuts and Dane Family Limited Partnership d/b/a Pro-Cuts (hereinafter "Defendants") have continuously been and are now doing business in the State of Texas and the City of Bellmead, and have continuously had at least fifteen employees.

5. At all relevant times, Defendants have continuously been an employer engaged in an industry affecting commerce under Sections 701(b), (g) and (h) of Title VII, 42 U.S.C. §2000e-(b), (g) and (h).

#### STATEMENTS OF CLAIMS

6. More than thirty days prior to the institution of this lawsuit, Lois Hall filed a charge with the Commission alleging violations of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, by the Defendants. All conditions precedent to the institution of this lawsuit have been fulfilled.

7. Since at least September 2005 the Defendants have engaged in unlawful employment practices at their Bellmead, Texas, facility in violation of Section 703(a) (1) of Title VII, 42 U.S.C. §2000e-2(a)(1), by reducing the work hours of Lois Hall and constructively discharging her from her emplyment due to her race, Black.

8. The result of the foregoing practices has been to deprive Lois Hall of equal employment opportunities.

9. The unlawful employment practices complained of in paragraph 7, above, were intentional.

10. The unlawful employment practices complained of in paragraphs 7, above, were done with malice or with reckless indifference to the federally protected rights of Lois Hall.

### PRAYER FOR RELIEF

Wherefore, the Commission respectfully requests that this Court:

A. Grant a permanent injunction enjoining the Defendants, their officers, successors, assigns, and all persons in active concert or participation with them, from engaging in any employment practice which discriminates on the basis of race, or which facilitates, condones or encourages employees to create or tolerate a racially hostile environment.

B. Grant a permanent injunction enjoining the Defendants, their officers, successors, assigns, and all persons in active concert or participation with them, from retaliating against employees who oppose what they reasonably believe to be unlawful employment practices or who otherwise participate in Title VII proceedings.

C Order the Defendants to institute and carry out policies, practices, and programs which provide equal employment opportunities for Lois Hall and eradicate the effects of their past and present unlawful unemployment practices.

D. Order the Defendants to make whole Lois Hall by providing appropriate back pay with prejudgment interest, in amounts to be proved at trial, and other affirmative relief necessary to eradicate the effects of Defendants' unlawful employment practices, including but not limited to rightful-place reinstatement or front pay in lieu of reinstatement.

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E. Order the Defendants to make Lois Hall whole by providing compensation for past and future non-pecuniary losses resulting from the unlawful employment practices described in paragraph 7, above, including but not limited to, pain and suffering, humiliation, embarrassment, emotional distress, anxiety, and loss often enjoyment of life, in amounts to be determined at trial.

F. Order the Defendants to pay Lois Hall punitive damages for their malicious conduct or reckless indifference described in paragraphs 7, above, in an amount to be determined at trial.

G. Grant such further relief as the Court deems necessary and proper in the public interest.

H. Award the Commission its costs in this action.

#### JURY TRIAL DEMAND

The Commission requests a jury trial on all questions of fact raised by its Complaint.
